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City of Thorns Ben Rawlence, 2016-01-05 Finalist for the Dayton Literary Peace Prize Named a Best of Book of the Year by The Economist and Foreign Affairs Los Angeles Times Book Prize Finalist The Dadaab refugee camp is many things to the charity workers it is a humanitarian crisis to the Kenyan government a nursery for terrorists to the Western media a dangerous no go area But to its half a million residents it is their last resort Situated hundreds of miles from any other settlement deep within the inhospitable desert of northern Kenya where only thorn bushes grow Dadaab is a city like no other Its buildings are made from mud sticks or plastic Its entire economy is grey And its citizens survive on rations and luck Over the course of four years Ben Rawlence became a firsthand witness to a strange and desperate place getting to know many of those who had come seeking sanctuary Among them are Guled a former child soldier who lives for football Nisho who scrapes an existence by pushing a wheelbarrow and dreaming of riches Tawane the indomitable youth leader and Kheyro a student whose future hangs upon her education In *City of Thorns* Rawlence interweaves the stories of nine individuals to show what life is like in the camp sketching the wider political forces that keep the refugees trapped Lucid vivid and illuminating *City of Thorns* is an urgent human story with deep international repercussions brought to life through the people who call Dabaab home

Europe and the Refugee Crisis Frances Trix, 2018-11-29 Since 2014 more than 60 million people have been displaced from their homes across the Middle East and Africa The European Refugee Crisis as it has come to be known is now the largest such crisis since the aftermath of World War II How have local communities reacted to the influx of asylum seekers And what can we learn from their responses Frances Trix here offers a wide ranging ethnographical and anthropological study of local individual responses to refugees from Macedonia to Germany Based on extensive interviews and field work in Europe Trix focuses for the first time on the ways that refugees have been welcomed or not as the case may be by various individuals and communities Her work ranges from Macedonians who established an NGO and lobbied to allow the refugees to use the train to the police charged with border management from a German organic food store owner who by her actions set the positive tone in her village a retired IT manager who coordinates refugee volunteers for his entire town to the district work organisation director who deems refugees unsuitable for multiple reasons The material is measured throughout against Trix's anthropological experience as well as reference to the historical and political contexts in which events are unfolding This book is essential reading for all those working on the refugee crisis and the prospects both local and global for the future

Bioviolence William Watkin, 2021-07-18 Aylan Isis Begum Grenfell Trump Harambe Guantanamo Syria Brexit Johnson COVID migrants trolling George Floyd Trump Gazing over the fractured contested territories of the current global situation Watkin finds that all these diverse happenings have one element in common They occur when biopolitical states in trying to manage and protect the life rights of their citizens habitually end up committing acts of coercion or disregard against the very people they have promised to protect When states tasked with making us live find themselves letting us die then they are practitioners of a particular kind of force that Watkin calls bioviolence This book explores and exposes the many aspects of contemporary biopower and bioviolence neglect exclusion surveillance regulation encampment trolling fake news terrorism and war As it does so it demonstrates that the very term violence is a discursive construct an effect of language made real by our behaviours embodied by our institutions and disseminated by our technologies In short bioviolence is how the contemporary powers that be make us do what they want Resolutely interdisciplinary this book is suitable for all scholars students and general readers in the fields of IR political theory philosophy the humanities sociology and journalism

Shackled Rebecca A. In 2015 an unprecedented number of people from Africa and the Near East took flight and sought refuge in Europe By the end of that year some 1.8 million migrants had arrived in the EU the vast majority having come across the Mediterranean Since then despite measures to host some of the people fleeing the Syrian war in Turkey and concurrent attempts to physically seal off some borders in Eastern Europe the numbers of refugees traveling to Europe has continued to top half a million annually A mass migration on a scale not witnessed in modern times is underway and it has presented Europe with its greatest challenge of the twenty first century Asfa Wossen Asserate argues here that building higher fences or finding more effective methods of integration will only in the long term perpetuate rather than solve the problems associated with these large numbers of displaced refugees We need to realize that we are only treating the symptoms of an oncoming catastrophe and that if we are to respond to mass migration we will ultimately have to understand its causes African Exodus places its emphasis firmly on the causes of the refugee crisis which are to be found not least in Europe itself and charts ways in which we might deal with it effectively in the long term In the course of this analysis Asserate asks why our view of Africa a troubled continent but rich in so many ways is so distorted How can we combat the corrupt authoritarian regimes that stymie progress and development Why are millions fleeing to Europe How is the EU complicit in the migration crisis And finally in practical terms what can be done and what prospects does the
