*On the Study Methods of Our Time* Giambattista Vico, 2018-08-06 *On the Study Methods of Our Time* remains a key text for anyone interested in the development of Vico's thought and serves as a concise introduction to his work. Scholars and students in such disciplines as the history of philosophy, intellectual history, literary theory, rhetoric, and the history and philosophy of education will find this volume helpful and fascinating. Giambattista Vico's first original work of philosophy, *On the Study Methods of Our Time* 1708-9 takes up the contemporary quarrel between the ancients and the moderns and provides a highly interesting statement of the nature of humanistic education. This edition makes available again Elio Gianturco's superb 1965 English translation of a work generally regarded as the earliest statement by Vico of the fundamentals of his position. An important contribution to the development of the scientism versus humanism debate over the comparative merits of classical and modern culture, this book lays out Vico's powerful arguments against the compartmentalization of knowledge which results from the Cartesian world view. In opposition to the arid logic of Cartesianism, Vico here celebrates the humanistic tradition and posits the need for a comprehensive science of humanity which recognizes the value of memory and imagination.

Following this lead, Mali shows how Vico came to forge his new scientific theories about the mythopoeic constitution of consciousness, society, and history by reappraising or rehabilitating the ancient and primitive mythical traditions which still persist in modern times. He further relates Vico's radical redefinition of these traditions as the true narrations of all religious, social, and political practices in the civil world to his unique historical depiction of Western civilisation as evolving in a rational and cyclical motion. On this account, Mali elaborates the wider, distinctly revisionist implications of Vico's New Science for the modern human sciences. He argues that inasmuch as the New Science exposed the linguistic and other cultural systems of the modern world as being essentially mythopoeic, it challenges not only the Christian and Enlightenment ideologies of progress in his time but also the main cultural ideologies of our time.

Tiscione, 2024-04-30 From the twin birth of western rhetoric and law in the Greek speaking world in the first millennium BCE law and rhetoric were deeply connected in the ancient world In the modern era of legal practice the clear connections between law and classical rhetoric have largely been lost to both those trained in the law and those who study rhetoric This

interdisciplinary reader reestablishes those lost connections by pairing primary source materials in classical rhetoric and contemporary law. The chapters in this volume show that ancient rhetorical texts can deepen or disrupt contemporary notions about principles that lie at the root of western legal traditions and return to us our past making it possible for scholars across several disciplines to build on work accomplished centuries before. Broken into four parts, this volume first covers the historical development of rhetoric. In Part Two, volume editor Mootz and scholar David A. Frank look at rhetorical theorists at bookends of an era when classical rhetoric was devalued as a mode of thought. Mootz discusses the hegemonic wave of Enlightenment epistemology that separated law from rhetoric and Frank shows that where Cartesian rationality fails in the modern era, the humanistic tradition of rhetoric allows law to respond to the needs of justice. Part Three consists of ten chapters that each 1) introduce a classical rhetorical theorist to the reader, 2) provide an excerpt from a text by that theorist, and then 3) demonstrate the relevance of that work to a contemporary court case. Moving from the Sophists through Aristotle and Plato and their Greek contemporaries to the Roman rhetoricians Cicero and Quintilian and finally to the early medieval rhetorician St. Augustine, these reprinted classical texts are contextualized by leading scholars in law, classics, and rhetoric, each with probing discussion questions for readers to engage and interact with the materials rhetorically. This vital resource of primary texts demonstrates how rhetoric illuminates the operation of the legal system and reconnects law to its rhetorical roots. Structured for use by scholars in critical inquiry and well suited for use in graduate or law school courses, *Classical Rhetoric and Contemporary Law* will be of interest to law, rhetoric, English, and communication scholars and as an interactive catalyst to examine the ways in which ancient rhetorical theory informs our understanding of law practice today.

annotated supplied with an extensive introduction completed by historical and biographical documents and graced with evocative illustrations Legal scholars philosophers historians and political scientists throughout the world may now discover a classic by one of the world's great jurists Giambattista Vico 1668 1744 spent his entire life in Naples where he taught at the University of Naples from 1699 the year he won the Chair of Rhetoric and Forensic Eloquence to 1741 the year Gennaro Vico his son took over the duty of lecturer In 1723 after having written the *Universal Right* he competed though without success for the Chair of Civil Law at the same University He wrote the *Universal Right* in Latin the official and universal language of scholarly works to prove his competency in the field of law and jurisprudence The *Universal Right* had a continuous relevance to the development and growth of juristic studies both in Italy and in Europe where it was translated into French and German From the eighteenth to the twentieth century the *Universal Right* influenced the writings and teaching of the practitioners of the Forum Emmanuele Duni Antonio Genovesi Jules Michelet Francesco Lomonaco Mario Francesco Pagano Gian Domenico Romagnosi Cesare Lombroso Pasquale Galluppi Cesare Beccaria and among the many recent jurists Emilio Betti who taught in Italy and Germany the author of *Allgemeine Auslegungslehre als Methodik der Geisteswissenschaften* Due to the influence of Benedetto Croce's disapproving interpretation the *Universal Right* remained often overshadowed by the *New Science* in its three editions of 1725 1730 and 1744 As we start the twenty first century scholars are by passing Croce's statement and are looking at the *Universal Right* with due objectivity and renewed interest While the *New Science* has been available since 1948 the *Universal Right* appears now for the first time in English the contemporary universal language Contrary to the opinion of some scholars Vico in the *New Science* stated that he did not regret having written the *Universal Right* he used the copy in his possession as a reference manual for all the works written afterward until 1735 Andrea Battistini wrote When an English translation of the *Diritto universale* *Universal Right* is available which will be able to rectify the trend toward contemporary relevance with a greater sense of historicity through an emphasis on the debt to Roman jurisprudence one will finally arrive at a synthetic overall view obscured today by the numerous specialized analyses At all events however it is to be hoped that the multiplicity of voices the dialectical battle of interpretations and the duel between historicity and contemporary relevance do not subside Isaiah Berlin stated that Vico was not read and thus his ideas were the treasure trove in the hands of a few specialists and in like manner they remained to our day Other scholars have mentioned the copiatori di copycats of Vico when speaking about the history and transmission of ideas In regard to *Universal Right* contemporary research and writing is pale and scarce given the unavailability of translations and the difficulties of the original
