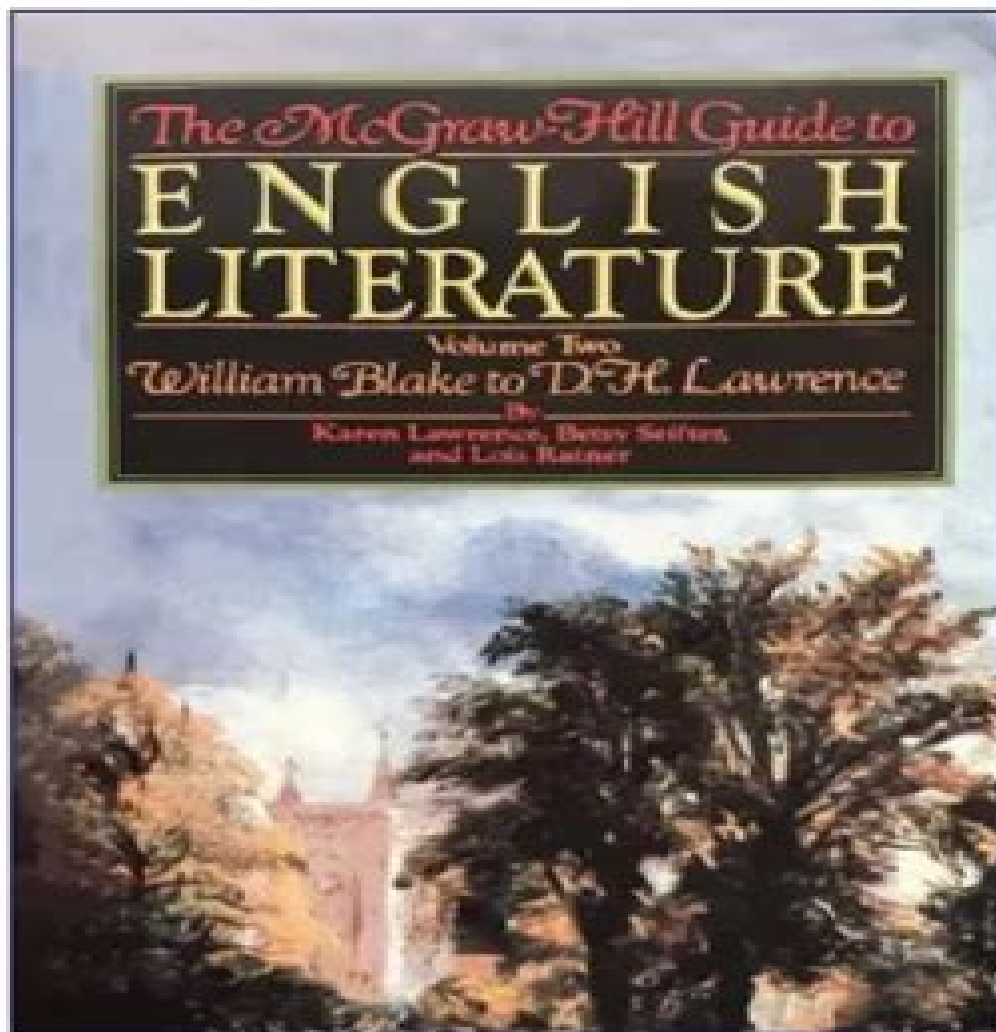

Berzenji, 2017-08-02 This edited book is the work of four years where the writers try to present a different study and understanding of some of T S Eliot's poetry and his unique style of being a modern poet not exactly like the other modernist poets such as Ralph Waldo Emerson We have found that Eliot in his poetry and prose writings was a modernist writer who unlike other modernist poets did not accept the way others rejected the values of religion and tradition Eliot focuses more on the role of religion and tradition in the psychological state of the individual and its impact upon the social stability His viewpoint regarding the vital role of spirituality in the life of the individual could be clearly seen in his poetic poems and prose writings but this aspect has been too little or not tackled as it is done with Homer *Joyce's Ulysses* Robert D. women by only looking after children many of them turned to prostitution because they did not have any source of income therefore they used that as a way to earn money to maintain life These are the characteristics of the modern city which are shared by all the countries especially Europe Eliot insists on the necessity of turning from world to God He believed that God can solve their problems because man or any other earthly power could not change that gloomy and aimless life which modern man complained against
