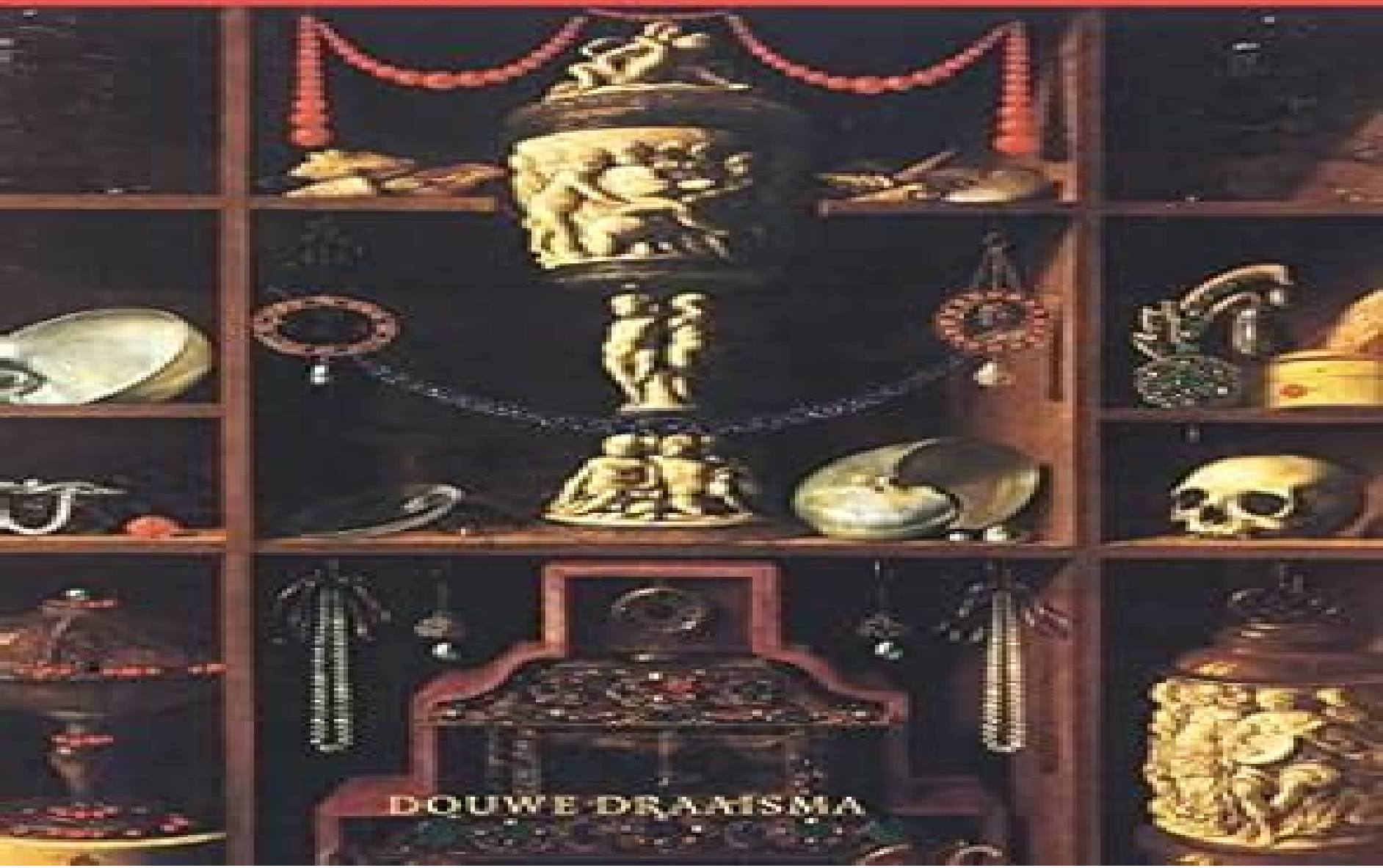

Draaisma, 2000-12-07 What is memory It is at the same time ephemeral unreliable and essential to everything we do Without memory we lose our sense of identity reasoning even our ability to perform simple physical tasks Yet it is also elusive and difficult to define and throughout the ages philosophers and psychologists have used metaphors as a way of understanding it First published in 2000 this fascinating book takes the reader on a guided tour of these metaphors of memory from ancient times to the present day Crossing continents and disciplines it provides a compelling history of ideas about the mind by exploring the way these metaphors have been used metaphors often derived from the techniques and instruments developed over the years to store information ranging from wax tablets and books to photography computers and even the hologram Accessible and thought provoking this book should be read by anyone who is interested in memory and the mind

The Language of Memory in a Crosslinguistic Perspective Mengistu Amberber, 2007 This book offers for the first time a detailed comparative study of how speakers of different languages express memory concepts While there is a robust body of psycholinguistic research that bears on how memory and language are related there is no comparative study of how speakers themselves conceptualize memory as reflected in their use of language to talk about memory This book addresses a key question how do speakers of different languages talk about the experience of having prior experiences coming to mind remembering or failing to come to mind forgetting A complex array of answers is provided through detailed grammatical and semantic investigation of different languages including English German Polish Russian and also a number of non Indo European languages Amharic Cree Dalabon Korean and Mandarin In addition the book calls for a broader interdisciplinary engagement by urging that cognitive semantics be integrated with other sciences of memory

Emden, 2010-10-01 Nietzsche and the philosophy of language have been a well trafficked crossroads for a generation but almost always as a checkpoint for post modernism and its critics This work takes a historical approach to Nietzsche s work on language connecting it to his predecessors and contemporaries rather than his successors Though Nietzsche invited identification with Zarathustra the solitary wanderer ahead of his time for most of his career he directly engaged the intellectual currents and scientific debates of his time Emden situates Nietzsche s writings on language and rhetoric within their wider historical context He demonstrates that Nietzsche is not as radical in his thinking as has been often supposed and that a number of problems with Nietzsche disappear when Nietzsche s works are compared to works on the same subjects by writers of the 18th and 19th centuries Further the relevance of rhetoric and the history of rhetoric to philosophy and the history of philosophy is reasserted in consonance with Nietzsche s own statements and practices Important in this regard are the role of fictions descriptions and metaphor

City of Remembering Susan Tucker, 2016-05-19 City of Remembering represents a rich testament to the persistence of a passionate form of public history In exploring one particular community of family historians in New Orleans Susan Tucker reveals how genealogists elevate a sort of subterranean foundation of the city sepia photographs of the Vieux Carr sturdy pages of birth registrations from St Louis Cathedral small scraps of the earliest French Superior Council records elegant and weighty leaves of papers used by notaries and ledgers from the judicial deliberations of the Illustrious Spanish Cabildo They also explore coded letters left by mistake accounts carried over oceans and gentle prods of dying children to be counted and thus to be remembered Most of all the family historians speak of continual beginnings both in the genesis of their own research processes but also of American dreams that value the worth of every individual life The author an archivist who has worked for over thirty years asking questions about how records figure in the lives of individuals and cultures also presents a national picture of genealogy s origins uses changing forms and purposes Tucker examines both the past and the present and draws from oral history interviews ethnographic fieldwork and archival research Illustrations come from individuals archives and libraries in New Orleans Richmond Washington DC and Salt Lake City as well as Massachusetts and Wisconsin demonstrating the contrasts between regions and how those practitioners approach their work in each setting Ultimately Tucker shows that genealogy is more than simply tracing lineage the pursuit becomes a fascinating window into people neighborhoods and the daily life of those individuals who came before us
