*Old English Ecotheology* Courtney Barajas, 2025-10-01 Old English Ecotheology examines the impact of environmental crises on early medieval English theology and poetry Like their modern counterparts theologians at the turn of the first millennium understood the interconnectedness of the Earth community and affirmed the independent subjectivity of other than humans The author argues for the existence of a specific Old English ecotheology and demonstrates the influence of that theology on contemporaneous poetry Taking the Exeter Book as a microcosm of the poetic corpus she explores the impact of early medieval apocalypticism and environmental anxiety on Old English wisdom poems riddles elegies and saints lives

*Emotional Practice in Old English Literature* Alice Jorgensen, 2024 An examination of how emotions were practised and performed through Old English texts Scholarship is increasingly interested in investigating concepts of emotion found in Old English literature This study takes the next step arguing that both heroic and religious texts were vehicles for emotional practice that is for doing things with emotion Using case studies from heroic poetry Beowulf The Battle of Brunanburh and The Battle of Maldon religious poetry Christ I and Christ III and homilies selections from the Vercelli Book Blickling Homilies and the works of Wulfstan it shows via detailed close readings that texts could be used to act out emotional styles manage the emotions arising from specific events and negotiate relationships both within social groups and with God Meanwhile a chapter on the Old English Boethius explores how the control of unruly emotions is theorized as the transfer of attachment from the things of this world to the things of the divine Overall the volume offers new angles on the social functions of genres and questions of reception and performance and it gives insight into how early medieval people used emotions to relate to their world temporal and eternal

**Light of the Everlasting Life** Leah Pope Parker, 2025-08-26 From disability metaphors to narratives structured around bodies presented as aberrant early medieval English thoughtworlds conveyed the promise of resurrection and the hope of salvation through crippled and disabled bodies *Light of the Everlasting Life* argues that early medieval Christian eschatology as manifested in Old English literary texts was a crippled eschatology a theology of the afterlife that relied upon disabled bodies and concepts related to disability in order to convey promises of resurrection and salvation In addition to demonstrating how literature manifested theological approaches to the afterlife Leah Pope Parker articulates the ways of thinking about bodies and disability that were available to ordinary early medieval people many of whom experienced their bodies in ways that resonate with what we call disability today but who rarely appear in the historical record By analyzing Old English texts including Alfredian translations of saints' lives and poetry from the Exeter and Vercelli Books Parker introduces novel ways of characterizing disability's effects in literature Spiritual prosthesis reveals rhetorical narrative and theological reliance upon disability to convey the promise of a Christian afterlife Systems of aberrance emerge as a result in which bodies marked as deviant including disabled monstrous heroic saintly and dead bodies form a network of embodiments that reinforce the narratives they inhabit and that of Christian salvation history Locating crippled eschatology in early medieval literature *Light of the Everlasting Life* rewrites standard histories of disability of the body and of medieval Christian eschatology
