Any thinking about music will always have come too late. The future perfect tense of this construction specifies the temporal situation in which the project of theorizing music necessarily occurs, namely, in a time that is out of joint. Like the grammatical future perfect, music's being is neither fully present nor fully past nor merely in the future, but rather is lodged in that temporal space of which one can only ever say that it will have been. This is so because music unfolds in time, even as time, and vanishes for good with the last notes of its performance. Even in an age in which music can be recorded, archived, and infinitely reproduced by a plethora of technical devices, this phenomenon persists. Music comes into its own in time, exists and formally generates itself in time, and thematizes, as one of its central concerns, the very experience of time. If the time in which music takes place, that is, the time that belongs to music, gives music over to time while, at the same time, setting time to music, then any philosophical engagement with music must come to terms with the out-of-jointness of the time that affords us both
