respectively Heterogeneity in cancer sites has been observed in India Most common cancer sites observed in men are lung mouth esophagus stomach and nasopharynx Mathur et al 2020 with highest incidence rate of lung and mouth in metropolitan cities including Delhi Bray et al 2018 Breast and cervix uteri cancer type are most diagnosed in women with highest incidence rate of breast cancer in metropolitan cities Mathur et al 2020 posing a health challenge to women in India Chaturvedi et al 2015 According to Nand kumar Head of National Cancer one in every 8 Indian is at a risk of developing cancer once in their lifetime Hearing a word of cancer is in itself a huge thing and it can have a profound impact Cancer diagnoses commence a long journey of treatment effecting physical psychological health and well being having a direct impact on relationship with family members Nursing Times, Nursing Mirror ,2007
