Young, 2016-01-11 From its earliest appearance in the mid 1600s the lyric theater form of zarzuela captivated Spanish audiences with its witty writing and lively musical scores Clinton D Young s Music Theater and Popular Nationalism in Spain 1880 1930 persuasively links zarzuela s celebration of Spanish history and culture to the development of concepts of nationalism and national identity at the dawn of the twentieth century As a weak Spanish government focused its energy on preventing a recurrence of mid nineteenth century political upheavals the project of articulating a national identity occurred at the popular level particularly in cultural venues such as the theater Zarzuela suited this aim well depicting the lives of everyday citizens amid the rapidly changing norms brought about by industrialization and urbanization It also integrated regional differences into a unified vision of Spanish national identity a zarzuela performance set in Madrid could incorporate forms of music and folk dancing native to areas of the country as far distant as Andalusia and Catalonia A true music of the people zarzuela offered its audiences an image of what a more modern Spain might look like Zarzuela alone could not create a unified concept of Spanish identity particularly with competition from new forms of mass culture and the rise of the Primo de Rivera dictatorship in the 1920s Yet as this riveting study shows it made an indelible contribution to popular culture and nationalism Young s history brings to life the stories songs and evolving contexts of a uniquely Spanish art form

Schechter, 2024-07-12 This book is a biography of Pueblonuevo del Terrible a mining town located in Andalusia Spain Based on previously unexamined sources the study paints a fresh portrait of industrial workers and their families in Córdoba province enriching our understanding of this mostly agricultural region Previous studies of laboring communities in Spain have identified radical workers miners among them as a destabilizing element due to their insurgent protest activity including lethal violence This study by contrast describes both worker activism and cross class organizing as constructive not destructive and aimed at integration into Spanish society Economically the mining zone was dominated by a French company in the Rothschild portfolio But by running their own city waging peaceful labor strikes raising a church building housing and honoring their dead residents turned a quasi colonial outpost into a pueblo worth defending and they rallied in defense of the Republic at the outbreak of the Spanish Civil War In the making of Pueblonuevo del Terrible Spanish men and women contended with the perils of mine work the jolts of industrial capitalism creeping fascism and civil war As such this book tells a village scale story of global events that defined the twentieth century

Geographies of Urban Female Labor and Nationhood in Spanish Culture, 1880-1975 Mar Soria,2020-05-01 Mar Soria presents an innovative cultural analysis of female workers in Spanish literature and films Drawing from nation building theories the work of feminist geographers and ideas about the construction of the marginal subject in society Soria examines how working women were perceived as Other in Spain from 1880 to 1975 By studying the representation of these marginalized individuals in a diverse array of cultural artifacts Soria contends that urban women workers symbolized the desires and anxieties of a nation caught between traditional values and rapidly shifting socioeconomic forces Specifically the representation of urban female work became a mode of reinforcing and contesting dominant discourses of gender class space and nationhood in critical moments after 1880 when social and economic upheavals resulted in fears of impending national instability Through these cultural artifacts Spaniards wrestled with the unresolved contradictions in the gender and class ideologies used to construct and maintain the national imaginary Whether for reasons of inattention or disregard of issues surrounding class dynamics nineteenth and twentieth century Spanish literary and cultural critics have assumed that

working women played only a minimal role in the development of Spain as a modern nation. As a result, relatively few critics have investigated cultural narratives of female labor during this period. Soria demonstrates that without considering the role working women played in the construction and modernization of Spain, our understanding of Spanish culture and life at that time remains incomplete.

Staging Buenos Aires Kristen L. McCleary, 2024-07-15 Staging Buenos Aires centers theater as a source of historical inquiry to understand how nonelites experienced and shaped a city undergoing dramatic transformations. Commercial theater constituted the core of the city's public sphere, one in which middle-class playwrights and audiences assumed the leading role. Audiences and critics often disagreed about what was acceptable entertainment. Playwrights used theater to promote their own ideas of sociopolitical change, creating a space for working and middle-class audiences to identify and push back against imposed regulations and attitudes. Plays helped audience members work through dramatic shifts in societal norms as urbanization and industrialization resulted in the visible decline of patriarchal social structures made most visible in the urban sphere.
