Paul Klee Paul Klee, 2006 Between 1916 and 1925 Paul Klee 1879 1940 made some 50 hand puppets for his son Felix of which 30 are still in existence For the heads he used materials from his own household beef bones and electrical outlets bristle brushes leftover bits of fur and nutshells Soon he began to sew costumes These characters and small works do not pretend to be great art but at the same time they are superbly imaginative sweetly reminiscent of Klee's relationships with his family and beautifully illustrative of the artistic and social developments of the time Readers will see the chronological proximity of Dada and Kurt Schwitters's collages in Klee's Matchbox Ghost the German National caricatures one of the era's more ominous political types An introductory essay tracks the work's links to other avant garde puppetry and to Klee's sculptural works and notes his connections to the theater For their part Klee's son Felix and his grandson Alexander tell the story of how the figures were created

Suter, 2010-02-01 In 1933 Paul Klee's work was branded as Entartete Kunst Degenerate Art by the National Socialists and he was dismissed from his professorial post at the Dsseldorf Academy of Fine Arts This led him together with his wife Lily to return to his real home of Bern Here his avant garde art was not understood and Klee found himself in unasked for isolation In 1935 Klee started to suffer from a mysterious disease The symptoms included changes to the skin and problems with the internal organs In 1940 Paul Klee died but it was only 10 years after his death that the illness was actually given the name scleroderma in a publication about Klee However the diagnosis remained mere conjecture Since his adolescence the dermatologist and venereologist Dr Hans Suter has been fascinated by Paul Klee and his art and more than 30 years ago this fascination spurred him to commence research into the illness and its influence on the art of Paul Klee's final years It was due to Dr Suter's meticulous investigations that Klee's illness could be defined as diffuse systemic sclerosis In this book the author assembles his findings and describes the rare and complex disease in a clear and comprehensible way Further he empathetically interprets more than 90 of Klee's late works The point of view of a dermatologist renders a unique source of information It provides on one hand new insights into everyday medical practices at the University of Bern in the 1930s which will fascinate doctors and local historians alike While on the other hand art historians and art lovers will be absorbed by the newly discovered links between Paul Klee's work and his illness *Architecture as a Performing Art* Marcia Feuerstein, Gray Read, 2016-04-15 How do buildings act with people and among people in the performances of life This collection of essays reveals a deep alliance between architecture and the performing arts uncovering its roots in ancient stories and tracing a continuous tradition of thought that emerges in contemporary practice With fresh insight the authors ask how buildings perform with people as partners rather than how they look as formal compositions They focus on actions the door that offers the possibility of making a dramatic entrance the window that frames a scene and the city street that is transformed in carnival The essays also consider the design process as a performance improvised among many players and offer examples of recent practice that integrates theater and dance This collection advances architectural theory history and criticism by proposing the lens of performance as a way to engage the multiple roles that buildings can play without reducing them to functional categories By casting architecture as spatial action rather than as static form these essays open a promising avenue for future investigation For architects the essays propose integrating performance into design through playful explorations that can reveal intense relationships between people and place and among people in place Such practices develop an architectural imagination that intuitively asks How might people play out their stories in this place and How might this place spark new stories Questions such as these reside in the heart of all of the essays presented here Together they open a position in the intersection between everyday life and staged performance to rethink the role of architectural design *Stefan Wolpe and the Avant-Garde Diaspora* Brigid Maureen

meaning the house of building developed in three German cities it began in Weimar between 1919 and 1925 then continued in Dessau from 1925 to 1932 and finally ended in 1932 1933 in Berlin Three leaders presided over the growth of the movement Walter Gropius from 1919 to 1928 Hannes Meyer from 1928 to 1930 and Ludwig Mies van der Rohe from 1930 to 1933 Founded by Gropius in the rather conservative city of Weimar the new capital of Germany which had just been defeated by the other European nations in the First World War the movement became a flamboyant response to this humiliation Combining new styles in architecture design and painting the Bauhaus aspired to be an expression of a generational utopia striving to free artists facing a society that remained conservative in spite of the revolutionary efforts of the post war period Using the most modern materials the Bauhaus was born out of the precepts of William Morris and the Arts and Crafts movement introducing new forms inspired by the most ordinary of objects into everyday life The shuttering of the center in Berlin by the Nazis in 1933 did not put an end to the movement since many of its members chose the path of exile and established themselves in the United States Although they all went in different directions artistically their work shared the same origin The most influential among the Bauhaus artists were Anni Albers Josef Albers Marianne Brandt Marcel Breuer Lyonel Feininger Ludwig Hilberseimer Paul Klee Wassily Kandisky and Lothar Schreyer Through a series of beautiful reproductions this work provides an overview of the Bauhaus era including the history influence and major figures of this revolutionary movement which turned everyday life into art

Children's Culture and the Avant-Garde Marilynn Strasser Olson, 2013-03-05 This volume explores the mutual influences between children's literature and the avant garde Olson places particular focus on fin de siècle Paris where the Avant garde was not unified in thought and there was room for modernism to overlap with children's literature and culture in the Golden Age The ideas explored by artists such as Florence Upton Henri Rousseau Sir William Nicholson Paula Modersohn Becker and Marc Chagall had been disseminated widely in cultural productions for children their work in turn influenced children's culture These artists turned to children's culture as a new way of seeing allied to a contemporary interest in international artistic styles Children's culture also has strong ties to decadence and to the grotesque the latter of which became a distinctively Modernist vision This book visits the qualities of the era that were defined as uniquely childlike the relation of childhood to high and low art and the relation of children's literature to fin de siècle artistic trends Topics of interest include the use of non European figures the Golliwogg approaches to religion and pedagogy to oppression and motherhood to Nature in a post Darwinian world and to vision in art and life Olson's unique focus covers new ground by concentrating not simply on children's literature but on how childhood experiences and culture figure in art

In Defense of Don Giovanni Luisa Passerini, 2024 Who wants to champion the figure of Don Giovanni in the time of Harvey Weinstein and MeToo Don Giovanni is a rapist murderer serial seducer and a liar Can he ever be held up as a role model or seen as a figure to be enjoyed This is the task that the eminent Italian historian and lifelong feminist Luisa Passerini sets for herself in *In Defense of Don Giovanni* As she developed the long arc of her

distinguished career Don Giovanni surprisingly became not only her role model but also a secret object of research Taking her method from oral history Passerini creates a series of characters with whom she discusses the forms and incarnations of the myth of Don Giovanni across time from its first appearance in early medieval Spain and Commedia dell Arte to its many European variations and its transposition to the colonial and postcolonial world in the Middle East the Americas and Africa Pivoting round Don Giovanni s best known incarnation in Mozart s opera Passerini and he interlocutors meet in different locations from Venice and Bern to Paris and Turin They discuss plays films and operas and talk about art novels and psychoanalytic interpretations of the myth while also sharing their own life stories in which Don Giovanni often plays a part that is by turns destructive mischievous and full of the joy of life From his early beginnings in the Iberian Peninsula to recent analysis of the sexuality of colonial conquest and postcolonial revenge and return Don Giovanni shape shifts between rapacious hypermasculinity comic trickster and morally vacuous loser whose annoyingly persistent nemesis Don Ottavio emerges as an alternative and ultimately better object of desire As she tracts Don Giovanni s image across the world and through the centuries however Passerini comes to see that it also plays another role that of mirror in which women can see themselves emerge as individuals with their own life force back cover

The Klee Universe Paul Klee,2008 There are artists whose m tier is the observation or documentation of the world and artists who set the world aside altogether to build their own visionary cosmology designing its constituent parts from scratch as a personal mythology relayed in motifs Paul Klee 1879 1940 was such an artist as his aphorism Art does not reproduce the visible rather it makes visible testifies and The Klee Universe addresses his work from this perspective In 1906 Klee noted in his diary All will be Klee and in 1911 as the encyclopedist of his cosmos he began to meticulously chronicle his works in a catalogue that by the time he died was to contain more than 9 000 items Here in the fashion of an Orbis Pictus or a Renaissance emblem book Klee s oeuvre is made legible as a cogent entirety in thematic units address the human life cycle from birth and childhood to sexual desire parenthood and death music architecture theater and religion plants animals and landscapes and finally darker destructive forces in the shape of war fear and death The Klee Universe reimagines the artist as a Renaissance man an artist of great learning whose cosmos proves to be a coherent system of ideas and images Paul Klee 1879 1940 was born and died in Switzerland though he never obtained Swiss citizenship Technically of German nationality he taught at the Bauhaus from 1921 to 1926 alongside Wassily Kandinsky Franz Marc and others Seventeen of his works were included in the Nazi s infamous 1937 Munich exhibition of degenerate art

The Puppet Show Ingrid Schaffner, Carin Kuoni, 2008

The Institute of Contemporary Art ICA is pleased to present *The Puppet Show* a group exhibition that looks at the imagery of puppets in contemporary art International in scope *The Puppet Show* brings together 29 artists and several generations as reflected by works that range from a 1974 installation by Dennis Oppenheim to a new animation by the Swedish artist Nathalie Djurberg The exhibition concentrates on sculpture video and photography Some of the works involve actual puppets marionettes shadow puppets hand puppets and artists performing as puppeteers Other images evoke topics associated with puppetry manipulation miniaturization agency control Collectively these works show puppets to be a provocative and relevant imagery one that moves deep into social political and psychological terrains The puppet show takes as a historic point of departure one of the first episodes of avant garde art history Alfred Jarry s 1896 play *Ubu Roi* that was conceived as a puppet show *Ubu* s reign continues with the work of the South African artist William Kentridge in collaboration with the Handspring Puppet Company More recently puppets have taken hold of pop consciousness by way of films theater computer games and animation On a more political note current events and national leadership raise questions of agency that cogently relate to puppets Together with these collective points of reference *The Puppet Show* poses a larger cultural question why do
