Peacemaking and Religious Violence Roger A Johnson, 2011-05-26 From its very beginning Christian faith has been engaged with religious violence The first Christians were persecuted by their co religionists and then by imperial Rome Jesus taught them in such circumstances not to retaliate but to be peacemakers to love their enemies and to pray for their persecutors Jesus s response to religious violence of the first century was often ignored but it was never forgotten Even during those centuries when the church herself persecuted Christian heretics Jews and Muslims some Christians still struggled to bear witness to the peace mandate of their Lord In the thirteenth century Thomas Aquinas wrote a theology to help his Dominican brothers persuade Cathar Christians to return to their Catholic faith peacefully Ramon Lull a Christian student of Arabic and the Qur an sought to help his fellow Christians recognize the elements of belief they shared in common with the Muslims in their midst In the fifteenth century Nicholas of Cusa a Church Cardinal and theologian expanded Lull s project to include the newly discovered religions of Asia In the seventeenth century Lord Herbert an English diplomat and lay Christian began to identify the political union of church and government as a causal factor in the religious warfare of post Reformation Christendom One and a half centuries later Thomas Jefferson a lay theologian of considerable political stature won a political struggle in the American colonies to disestablish religion first in his home colony of Virginia and then in the new nation he helped to found All five of these theologians reclaimed the peace mandate of Jesus in their response to the religious violence of their own eras All of which points us to some intriguing Christian responses to religious violence in our own century as recounted in the epilogue

The Mosaic of Atonement Joshua M. McNall, 2019-08-27 The Mosaic of Atonement offers a fresh and integrated approach to historic models of atonement While modern treatments of the doctrine have tended toward either a defensive hierarchy in which one model is singled out as most important or a disconnected plurality in which multiple images are affirmed but with no order of arrangement this book argues for a reintegration of four famous pieces of atonement doctrine through the governing image of Christ shaped mosaic Unlike a photograph in which tiny pixels present a seamless blending of color and shape a mosaic allows each piece to retain its recognizable particularity while also integrating them in the service of a single larger image If one stands close one can identify individual squares of glass or tile that compose the greater picture And if one steps back there is the larger picture

to be admired Yet in the great mosaics of age old Christian churches the goal is not for viewers to construct the image as in a puzzle but to appreciate it So too with this mosaic of atonement doctrine While no one model is set above or against the others the book notes particular ways in which the pieces the feet heart head and hands mutually support one another to form a more holistic vision of Christ s work This is my body Jesus said to his followers and by reintegrating these oft dismembered aspects of atonement we will note fresh ways in which it was given for us Journal of Latin American Theology, Volume 19, Number 1 Lindy Scott, 2024-04-30 The articles in this issue of the Journal of Latin American Theology focus on history mission politics migration and worship Luis Tapia Rubio discusses the colonial nature of Bartolom de Las Casas s sixteenth century mission in Latin America and sits with the disturbing question of whether or not it is possible for Christian mission to be anything but colonial Valdir Steuernagel summarizes key points from the Lausanne Congresses on World Evangelization and diagnoses current challenges leading up to Lausanne IV in September 2024 Dar o L pez R illustrates the antidemocratic nature of fundamentalist evangelicals active in Latin American politics through the case study of the 2021 presidential elections in Peru Milton Mej a discusses the same political phenomenon but in the context of Colombia s decades long armed conflict His case study is the 2016 referendum on the peace agreement which evangelical opposition helped tip the balance to reject Mariani Xavier seeks to humanize immigrants by highlighting five biblical insights on immigration and then outlining action steps for Christians to put these biblical insights into practice Fabio Salguero Fagoaga diagnoses one reason that Christians fail to offer robust hospitality to immigrants and refugees aporophobia or discrimination against the poor The book reviews in this volume approach these same themes from different perspectives as the film review and theopoetry do from the posture of worship *Fighting Words* Hector Avalos, Is religion inherently violent If not what provokes violence in the name of religion Do we mischaracterize religion by focusing too much on its violent side In this intriguing original study of religious violence Prof Hector Avalos offers a new theory for the role of religion in violent conflicts Starting with the premise that most violence is the result of real or perceived scarce resources Avalos persuasively argues that religion creates new scarcities on the basis of unverifiable or illusory criteria Through a careful analysis of the fundamental texts of Judaism Christianity Islam and Hinduism Dr Avalos explains how four scarce resources have figured repeatedly in creating religious violence sacred space e g the perception by three world religions that Jerusalem is sacred the creation of holy scriptures believed to be privileged revelations of God s will group privilege stemming from such beliefs as a chosen people or predestination which also creates a group of outsiders and salvation by which concept some are accepted and others rejected Thus Avalos shows religious violence is often the most unnecessary violence of all since the scarce resources over which religious conflicts ensue are not actually scarce or need not be scarce Comparing violence in religious and nonreligious contexts Avalos makes the compelling argument that if we condemn violence caused by scarce resources as morally objectionable then we must consider even more objectionable violence

provoked by alleged scarcities that cannot be proven to exist He also examines the Nazi Holocaust and the Stalinist Terror which have been attributed to the pernicious effects of atheism or secular humanism By contrast Avalos pinpoints underlying religious factors as the cause of these horrific instances of genocidal violence This serious philosophical examination of the roots of religious violence adds much to our understanding of a perennial source of widespread human suffering Hector Avalos Ames IA is associate professor of Religious Studies at Iowa State University the author of five books on biblical studies and religion the former editor of the Journal for the Critical Study of Religion and executive director of the Committee for the Scientific Examination of Religion

Principalities and Powers Jamie Pitts, 2014-08-28 *Principalities and Powers* is an ambitious analysis of John Howard Yoder's complex sociological theory Jamie Pitts work transcends ideological boundaries which have perplexed the many writers who have approached the legacy of John Howard Yoder after his death in 1997 Although there is much disagreement a broad consensus is forming that his theology was on the one hand focused on the social and political meaning of the New Testament accounts of Jesus Christ and on the other hand sociologically reductive hermeneutically tendentious and ecclesiologically ambiguous *Principalities and Powers* proposes a revision of Yoder's theology that maintains its broadly sociological emphasis but corrects for its apparent methodological political and metaphysical problems Specifically adjustments are made to his social theory to open it to spiritual reality to hone its analytical approach and to clarify its political import To do so his preferred framework for social criticism the theology of the principalities and powers is examined in the context of his wider work and its critics and then synthesized with concepts from Pierre Bourdieu's influential reflexive sociology
