**Paul Klee** Annie Bourneuf, 2015-07-20 The book offers a new original look at the great European modernist Paul Klee and the interplay of word and image in the work he produced after WWI when the European avant garde was at its most adamant Bourneuf asks why was it that Klee immersed himself in crossings of image and text at the same time that so much avant garde art focused fiercely on the visual She proposes that Klee created forms that hover between the pictorial and the written to provoke the viewer to look slowly and contemplatively a mode of viewing the artist saw as both analogous to reading and threatened by new technological media such as film mass printing telephones and radio Bourneuf demonstrates how Klee's concern for the literary aspects of visual art is both the motive for and the means of his ironic play with modernist art theories and practices
