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Culture, Participation and Policy in the Municipal Public Park Abigail Gilmore, 2024-01-12 This book concerns the values and practices of participation in municipal public parks and the connections they have with cultural policy urbanism and social life Adopting a critical cultural policy lens it identifies the park as a mundane but extraordinarily treasured place for the production and exchange of cultural values regulation resistance and the practising of citizenship Drawing on extensive mixed methods research on everyday participation in diverse local cultural ecosystems in England and Scotland the book examines the social lives of parks and their users and the important public values that are generated through their common stewardship and usership It presents case studies of parks and co located museums as cultural public spheres which promote both commoning and commodification These are contextualized by histories of municipal parkmaking from the nineteenth century to the present and related to the making of local government and to other civic and cultural institutions The book highlights contemporary issues of austerity marketisation and de municipalisation within local government in the context of urban development It positions the public park as fundamental to democratic cultural governance and makes the case for the primacy of public trust ownership and park equity in safeguarding the right to the city
