

New World Literature: Tradition and Revolt in Latin America. By Arturo Torres-Ríosco. (Berkeley: University of California Press, 1949. Pp. 250. Notes and Index. \$3.75.)

Deploring what he views as a lack of real inter-American understanding in spite of all efforts toward that end, Señor Torres-Ríosco declares his intention in the present work as "to delve into the spiritual life of my continent; its literature serves me as a base upon which to explore and understand the 'man'." The task which he has set himself is, he confesses, no easy one, since to carry it out requires nothing less than an intimate knowledge of the twenty Spanish American literatures. "Whenever I write 'Spanish America,' I am assailed by doubt," he says. "Shall I consider Brazil also? . . . it is only right, if one thinks of *Hispania* and not of *Spain*, that it should be . . . an ingenuous mode of expression to include the entire continent."

In order to effect that interpretation of the spiritual values of Hispanic America which is the aim thus avowed, Professor Torres-Ríosco groups in the present work, with an Introduction of evaluation and analysis, a series of studies: *Colonial Culture in America*; *Sor Juana Inés de la Cruz*; *Independence and Romanticism*; *Martín Fierro*; *The Influence of French Culture*; *A Revaluation of Rubén Darío*; *José Enrique Rodó*; *Social Poetry*; *The Poetry of the Future*; and *The Parallel between Brazilian and Spanish American Literature* (which last title indicates a departure from his own terms of reference as indicated above).

One of the most interesting of these studies deals with Rubén Darío. Sr. Torres-Ríosco, who maintains the steadfast belief that Darío is the greatest of Spanish American poets and one of the greatest in the Spanish language, finds that Darío's popularity has declined in recent years in consequence of negative rather than positive reasons; because his poetry is neither social nor religious; because "he did not cultivate the Negro theme . . . [and because] he was not even a democratic poet." In contradistinction to these contemporary fashions in poetry, are all Darío's technical brilliance, the progressive clarity of his style, his poetic vision, his magical phrasing, the originality of his genius.

The revaluation of Rodó, to whom the author would give first rank as literary critic rather than as philosopher, is equally interesting. "Rodó's hostility toward the United States is basically unjustified," Sr. Torres-Ríosco comments, "for he knew nothing about the North American culture of his time." But Rodó's *Ariel* remains nevertheless "a spiritual message dedicated to the youth of America," an idealistic plea for the importance of beauty in the formation of society; although, as Sr. Torres-Ríosco points out, Rodó's counsel for attaining that ideal was vague, unrealistic and largely anti-democratic.

The evocation of Sor Juana; the brief but informative studies on *Social Poetry*, *Poetry of the Future*; and the parallel drawn between the literature of Brazil and that of the Spanish-speaking Republics, add to the value of a

Fitz, 2025-03-31 This book offers a systematic and comparative history of the evolution of literature in the Americas from the beginning to the present day It begins with an introduction that assesses the development of the field and then proceeds to a chapter on the literature of Pre Columbian and indigenous America It then moves forward chronologically from the arrival of the Europeans beginning in 1492 to the year 2026 Including indigenous literature the other American literatures represented in the book are those of Canada both Francophone and Anglophone the United States the Caribbean Francophone and Anglophone Spanish America and Brazil Not every book ever written in the Americas is included of course only those that in the author's estimation offer some valid point of comparison with other American literary cultures These points of comparison include issues of theme genre literary periods literature and other disciplines such as history art music or politics cases of influence and reception and translation The book's emphasis is on viewing American literature from a hemispheric and comparative lens *annual bibliography of english language and literature volume XXIX 1949* , *Visions of Empire in Colonial Spanish American Ekphrastic Writing* Kathryn M. Mayers, 2012 The process of shaping and asserting cultural identity in viceregal Spanish America occurred as much through the medium of pictures as through the medium of writing Focused on writing that references visual texts ekphrasis *Visions of Empire in Colonial Spanish American Ekphrastic Writing* examines the way words about pictures in the writing of three Spanish American Creoles Hernando Domínguez Camargo Juan de Espinosa Medrano and Sor Juana Inés de la Cruz negotiate the challenges that confronted the American born ruling elite in Spanish America during the contentious transitional period between the Conquest and Independence In Spanish America pictures have long served as a crucial medium for cultural communication In vast rural and urban regions where print culture is not deeply rooted and being cultured is not synonymous with being literate visual texts ranging from pre Hispanic pictographic codices to Baroque architectural surfaces to postmodern painted murals have played an essential role in shaping and asserting cultural identity During the viceregal era texts that referenced such visual texts proliferated in Latin America particularly among Creole elites who found themselves trapped in an ambiguous political and social position between Spain and America At the level of content Creole ekphrases bear little obvious connection to categories of social privilege On the level of form however these ekphrases engage conventions of representation that reveal the social contingencies of the poetic gaze They refract the visual object through an ideologically charged language that invokes differentials of race class gender sexuality nationality and position within the colonial power structure *Visions of Empire* brings recent scholarship on visuality and
