Dedek, 2017-06-12 In *The Cemeteries of New Orleans* Peter B Dedek reveals the origins and evolution of the Crescent City's world famous necropolises exploring both their distinctive architecture and their cultural impact Drawing on a fascinating body of research Dedek takes readers from muddy fields of crude burial markers to extravagantly designed cities of the dead illuminating a vital and vulnerable piece of New Orleans's identity Where many histories of New Orleans cemeteries focus on the famous people buried within them Dedek sets his sights on the marble cutters burial society members journalists and tourists who shaped these graveyards into internationally recognizable emblems of the city In his detailed exploration of cemetery architecture Dedek reveals the impacts of ancient and medieval grave traditions and styles the city's geography and the arrival of trained European tomb designers such as the French architect J N B de Pouilly in 1833 and Italian artist and architect Pietro Gualdi in 1851 As Dedek shows the nineteenth century was a particularly critical era in the city's cemetery design Traditional French and Spanish patterns prevailed until the first garden cemetery Metairie Cemetery was built on the site of an old racetrack in 1872 Like the older walled cemeteries this iconic venue served as a lavish expression of fraternal and ethnic unity a backdrop to exuberant social celebrations and a destination for sightseers During this time cultural and religious customs such as the celebration of All Saints Day and the practice of Voodoo rituals flourished within the spatial bounds of these resting places Over the course of the twentieth and twenty first centuries however episodes of neglect and destruction gave rise to groups that aimed to preserve the historic cemeteries of New Orleans an endeavor that according to Dedek is still wanting for resources and political will Containing abundant illustrations *The Cemeteries of New Orleans* is a comprehensive and intriguing resource on these fascinating historic sites **New Orleans Architecture,**

Eric Platt, 2017-10-10 A study of Louisiana French Creole sugar planters role in higher education and a detailed history of the only college ever constructed to serve the sugar elite The education of individual planter classes cotton tobacco sugar is rarely treated in works of southern history Of the existing literature higher education is typically relegated to a

footnote providing only brief glimpses into a complex instructional regime responsive to wealthy planters R Eric Platt's *Educating the Sons of Sugar* allows for a greater focus on the mindset of French Creole sugar planters and provides a comprehensive record and analysis of a private college supported by planter wealth Jefferson College was founded in St James Parish in 1831 surrounded by slave holding plantations and their cash crop sugar cane Creole planters regionally known as the *ancienne* population designed the college to impart a genteel liberal arts education through instruction in architecture and geographic location Jefferson College played host to social class rivalries Creole Anglo American and French immigrant mirrored the revival of Catholicism in a region typified by secular mores was subject to the Americanization of south Louisiana higher education and reflected the *ancienne* population's decline as Louisiana's ruling population Resulting from loss of funds the college closed in 1848 It opened and closed three more times under varying administrations French immigrant private sugar planter and Catholic Marist before its final closure in 1927 due to educational competition curricular intransigence and the 1927 Mississippi River flood In 1931 the campus was purchased by the Society of Jesus Jesuits and reopened as a silent religious retreat It continues to function to this day as the Manresa House of Retreats While in existence Jefferson College was a social thermometer for the white French Creole sugar planter ethos that instilled the sons of sugar with a cultural heritage resonant of a region typified by the management of plantations slavery and the production of sugar

Touring the Antebellum South with an English Opera Company Michael Burden, 2020-10-21 The diary of Anton Reiff Jr c 1830-1916 is one of only a handful of primary sources to offer a firsthand account of antebellum riverboat travel in the American South The Pyne and Harrison Opera Troupe a company run by English sisters Susan and Louisa Pyne and their business partner tenor William Harrison hired Reiff then freelancing in New York to serve as musical director and conductor for the company's American itinerary The grueling tour began in November 1855 in Boston and then proceeded to New York Philadelphia Baltimore Pittsburgh and Cincinnati where after a three week engagement the company boarded a paddle steamer bound for New Orleans It was at that point that Reiff started to keep his

diary Diligently transcribed and annotated by Michael Burden Reiff's diary presents an extraordinarily rare view of life with a foreign opera company as it traveled the country by river and rail Surprisingly Reiff comments little on the Pyne Harrison performances themselves although he does visit the theaters in the river towns including New Orleans where he spends evenings both at the French Opera and at the Gaiety Instead Reiff focuses his attention on other passengers on the mechanics of the journey on the landscape and on events he encounters including the 1856 Mardi Gras and the unveiling of the statue of Andrew Jackson in New Orleans's Jackson Square Reiff is clearly captivated by the river towns and their residents including the enslaved whom he encountered whenever the boat tied up Running throughout the journal is a thread of anxiety for apart from the typical dangers of a river trip the winter of 1855-1856 was one of the coldest of the century and the steamer had difficulties with river ice Historians have used Reiff's journal as source material but until now the entire text which is archived in Louisiana State University's Special Collections in Hill Memorial Library has only been available in its original state As a primary source the published journal will have broad appeal to historians and other readers interested in antebellum riverboat travel highbrow entertainment and the people and places of the South Toni Morrison and the Bible Shirley A. Stave, 2006 This collection of essays critically interrogates Toni Morrison's use of the Bible in her novels examining the ways in which the author plays on the original text to raise issues of spirituality as it affects race gender and class Ideal for courses on Morrison or on explorations of the intersection of religion and literature this collection treats its topic with sophistication considering religion in its broadest possible sense and examining syncretic theologies as well as mainstream religions in its attempt to locate Morrison's work in a spiritual theological nexus **Margaret** Mary Lou Widmer, 1996-10-31 A biography of Margaret Haughery the beloved woman who went from a life of poverty to one of philanthropy and became known as the Angel of New Orleans Margaret Haughery gave everything she ever had to the orphans and the poor Despite being unable either to read or write she possessed an incredible business acumen which allowed her to donate including what she bequeathed in her will more than 500 000 throughout her life What is perhaps even more astounding is that Margaret lost everyone she ever loved yet she was still able to give so much love As a child in the Maryland area this Irish immigrant lost her parents and her baby sister when they died in a fever epidemic She was separated from her brother in the aftermath and he very well may have perished in the epidemic as well Then when she was a young wife and mother in New Orleans her husband died of consumption Soon afterward her newborn daughter died in her sleep Determined to not succumb to self pity and depression Margaret strengthened by her Roman Catholic faith dedicated the rest of her life to helping the orphans and the poor Helping to support an orphanage she first started a dairy to provide milk for the children Then she went on to earn a small fortune from running a local bakery This financial success allowed her to donate enormous monetary sums to charity Still her fiscal generosity was eclipsed by her spiritual gifts This docunovel has dialogue added to enliven the text *Park and Cemetery and Landscape Gardening*, 1916 **Fragile Grounds** Jessica H. The book highlights the state's vibrant diversity by showing its unique burial customs and traditions while it also identifies the urgent need for ongoing documentation of cultural elements at risk. Cemeteries associated with the culturally rich communities of Louisiana reflect the history and global settlement patterns of the state. Yet many are endangered due to recurring natural and man-made events. Nearly 80 percent of the nation's coastal land loss occurs in Louisiana. Coastal erosion, sinking land, flooding, storm surge, and sea level rise have led to an inland migration that threatens to unravel the fabric of Louisiana, and by association, hastens the demise of its burial places. As people are forced inland, migrants abandon, neglect, or often overlook cemeteries as part of the cultural landscape. In terms of erosion, when the land goes, the cemetery goes with it. Cemeteries fall prey to inland and coastal flooding. As cities grow outward, urban sprawl takes over the landscape. Cemeteries lose out to forces such as expansion, eminent domain, and urban neglect. Not only do cemeteries give comfort for the living, but they also serve as a vital link to the past. Once lost, that past cannot be recovered.

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
