James McDonnell and Donald Douglas McDonnellDouglas These stalwarts were very foresighted and willing to take calculated risks The ingenious Dr Robert Goddard inventor of the modern rocket developed a sound theory and conducted pioneering flight tests in the 1920s 1930s while overcoming many failures However Goddards rockets were not taken seriously enough in the United States to enable the development of practical missiles and launch vehicles But Germany sure took notice World War II gave the biggest impetus ever to advancing rocket science and related technologies The Nazi war machine funded Dr Wernher von Braun and his cohorts to develop rocketdriven weapons such as the V1 and V2 which killed thousands during World War II Fortunately for America von Braun and key members of his team decided to seek asylum in the United States when the war ended Now the country took up the engineering of rockets in earnest Von Braun went on to lead the American space program during the crucial decades of the 1950s 1960s He did more to advance missiles rockets spaceflight and enable manned landings on the moon than anybody else in America Six astronauts flew solo on six Project Mercury flights 1961-1963 Three of them joined another 13 astronauts to orbit Earth on 10 twoperson Project Gemini flights 1965-1966 Without a single failure The Soviet Union captured their fair share of German rocketeers including the influential Helmut Grttrup They learned everything possible from the German expatriates Then they cast the Germans aside and undertook rocket and missile development using indigenous experts like Sergei Korolyov and Valentin Glushko Like von Braun Korolyov was ingenious in his own right and led the development of Soviet rocket science until his untimely death in January 1966 Engineers and scientists are todays unsung heroes They work in the shadows without any public acclaim or recognition yet the technologies they develop touch every facet of our daily lives PROJECT MERCURY FAMILIARIZATION

NASA,2011-05 On October 4 1957 at 10 28 Moscow time a rocket carrying the world s first orbiting satellite roared into space signaling a new era in human history and the beginning of the so called space race an epic rivalry pitting the technological know how of the Soviet Union against that of the United States Despite some highly publicized failures the USA managed to answer the Russians with the successful launch of Explorer 1 in January of 1958 The next major milestone would be to put a human into orbit a goal that defined the USA s Project Mercury After a long series of test launches including a sub orbital flight with the chimp Ham on board Mercury astronaut Alan Shepard became the first American in space On May 5 1961 Shepard rode a Redstone rocket into space for a sub orbital flight that lasted under 16 minutes Nine months later John Glenn s Friendship 7 capsule was launched into space atop an Atlas booster and Glenn became the first American to orbit the earth Glenn remained in space for nearly five hours and circled the planet three times While these flights represented enormous achievements neither was an outright space race victory cosmonaut Yuri Gagarin s orbital flight of April 12 1961 earned him the title of first man in space and first man to orbit the Earth Designed by brilliant engineer Max Faget and a team at NASA the Mercury space capsule represented an entirely new class of vehicle Just large enough for a single astronaut the joke about the cramped capsule was that it was worn not ridden Despite reports otherwise the capsule

could be and was flown by astronauts who had attitude control thrusters at their disposal and a window for viewing The capsule also boasted manual re entry controls Created by NASA and contractor McDonnell Aircraft this Familiarization Manual explains all the systems aboard the Mercury space capsule including cabin controls environmental and stabilization controls and systems launch and re entry sequence procedures and navigation and communications equipment and procedures Dating from June of 1962 it represents a late revision of documents created at the beginning of the Mercury program Originally restricted this manual has been declassified and is presented in its entirety running nearly 400 pages

Treadwell, 2024-10-30 This book is about how the dreams of exploring other worlds became a reality with the Mercury Gemini and Apollo programs The problems encountered in the development of the spacecraft including the disastrous fire aboard Apollo 1 which resulted in the deaths of the three American astronauts Gus Grissom Ed White and Roger Chafee are covered When Neil Armstrong stepped out onto the surface of the Moon on 20 July 1969 many people thought that this was the first time man had visited its nearest neighbor Although this was the first manned landing there had been forty one missions prior to this by both the Americans and the Russians This book is about all those missions and the sixty five missions that followed Also included although in much lesser detail is the part the Russians played in the formative years of the space race and the problems they encountered culminating in the successful Apollo Soyuz program which proved that the two super powers could work together The laboratory in the sky Skylab the forerunner of the ISS station is also covered The book contains over 200 photographs all of which are either credited to NASA or from the author s own collection The sources include correspondence and the author s personal conversations with some of the astronauts involved in the early part of the space program

Stepping Stones to the Stars Terry C Treadwell,Henry Hartsfield,2010-05-28 *Stepping Stones to the Stars* is the story of manned spaceflight from its inception to the era of the Space Shuttle It begins with a short history of the evolution of the rocket before describing the first manned rocket flights by both the Americans and the Russians There is also the little known story of what is thought to be the earliest manned rocket flight said to have taken place in 1933 on the island of Rgen in the Baltic under the control of the German War Ministry The story continues through Yuri Gagarin becoming the first person in space and Neil Armstrong s giant leap for mankind to the first space stations Skylab Salyut and Mir With the development of the Shuttle the USA moved ahead in the space race but the Americans and Russians soon realised that it was easier to co operate than compete and the two nations began to work together for the first time Terry C Treadwell s book is a non technical history of human spaceflight that tells the exciting and dramatic story of how we took our early steps towards the stars
