**Frank O'Hara's New York School and Mid-Century Mannerism** Sam Ladkin, 2024-02-02 Frank O Hara s *New York School and Mid Century Mannerism* offers a ground breaking account of the poet Frank O Hara and the extraordinary cultural blossoming O Hara catalysed namely the mid century experimental and multi disciplinary arts scene the New York School Fresh accounts of canonical figures Jackson Pollock Willem de Kooning George Balanchine Fred Astaire and original work on those too little discussed Edwin Denby Elaine de Kooning resound with analysis of queer iconology from Michelangelo s David to James Dean Sam Ladkin argues that O Hara and the New York School revive Mannerism Turning away from interpretations of O Hara s Transcendentalism Romanticism or pastoralism mid century Mannerism helps explain O Hara s self conscious style its play with sweet and grand grace contortion of conventional measure risks with affectation conceits nonchalance and scrambling of high low culture Mannerism clarifies the sociability implicit in the formal innovations of the New York School The work also studies the kinship between art mediums by retooling rhetoric and recovering a perennial manneristic tendency beyond period style Genealogies of grace the *figura serpentina* *sprezzatura ornatus* and the marvellous exemplify qualities exhibited by O Hara s New York School Ladkin relates the essential role of dance in the New York School O Hara s reception has been tied to painting predominantly Abstract Expressionism He was also however a balletomane a fan for whom ballet was made up exclusively of qualities which other arts only aspire to in order to be truly modern Relaying ballet s Mannerist origins and aesthetics and demonstrating its influence alongside Broadway and Hollywood musical dance on art and poetry completes the portrait of mid century modernity

**The Beats, Black Mountain, and New Modes in American Poetry** Matt Theado, 2021-09-15 *The Beats Black Mountain and New Modes of American Poetry* explores correspondences amongst the Black Mountain and Beat Generation writers two of most well known and influential groups of poets in the 1950s The division

of writers as Beat or Black Mountain has hindered our understanding of the ways that these poets developed from mutual influences benefitted from direct relations and overlapped their boundaries This collection of academic essays refines and adds context to Beat Studies and Black Mountain Studies by investigating the groups intersections and undercurrents One goal of the book is to deconstruct the Beat and Black Mountain labels in order to reveal the shifting and fluid relationships among the individual poets who developed a revolutionary poetics in the 1950s and beyond Taken together these essays clarify the radical experimentation with poetics undertaken by these poets

**The Ballad of John Latouche** Howard Pollack, 2017-10-06 Born into a poor Virginian family John Treville Latouche 1914-56 in his short life made a profound mark on America's musical theater as a lyricist book writer and librettist The wit and skill of his lyrics elicited comparisons with the likes of Ira Gershwin Lorenz Hart and Cole Porter but he had too noted Stephen Sondheim a large vision of what musical theater could be and he proved especially venturesome in helping to develop a lyric theater that innovatively combined music word dance and costume and set design Many of his pieces even if not commonly known today remain high points in the history of American musical theater A great American genius in the words of Duke Ellington Latouche initially came to wide public attention in his early twenties with his cantata for soloist and chorus *Ballad for Americans* 1939 with music by Earl Robinson a work that swept the nation during the Second World War Other milestones in his career included the all black musical fable *Cabin in the Sky* 1940 with Vernon Duke an interracial updating of John Gay's classic *The Beggar's Opera* as *Beggar's Holiday* 1946 with Duke Ellington two acclaimed Broadway operas with Jerome Moross *Ballet Ballads* 1948 and *The Golden Apple* 1954 one of the most enduring operas in the American canon *The Ballad of Baby Doe* 1956 with Douglas Moore and the operetta *Candide* 1956 with Leonard Bernstein and Lillian Hellman Extremely versatile he also wrote cabaret songs participated in documentary and avant garde film translated poetry adapted plays and much else Meanwhile as one of Manhattan's most celebrated raconteurs and hosts he developed a wide range of friends in the arts including to name only a few Paul and Jane Bowles whom he introduced to each other Yul Brynner John Cage Jack Kerouac Frederick Kiesler Carson McCullers Frank O'Hara Dawn Powell Ned Rorem Virgil Thomson Gore Vidal and Tennessee Williams a dazzling constellation of diverse artists working in sundry fields all attracted to Latouche's brilliance and joie de vivre not to mention his support for their work This book draws widely on archival collections both at home and abroad including Latouche's diaries and the papers of Bernstein Ellington Moore Moross and many others to tell for the first time the story of this fascinating man and his work

***Spatial Poetics*** Yasmine Shamma, 2018 Focusing on Second Generation New York School poetry from 1960 to the present day this volume explores the poets who lived and wrote from or about New York the forms of their poems and the relationship between the structures they inhabited and the structures they created

***The Mirror Steamed Over*** Anthony Byrt, 2020-06-18 In the early sixties at the Royal College of Art in London three extraordinary personalities collided to reshape contemporary art and literature Barrie Bates who would become Billy Apple in November 1962 was an ambitious

young graphic designer from New Zealand who transformed himself into one of pop art's pioneers. At the same time his friend and fellow student David Hockney, young Northern and openly gay, was making his own waves in the London art world. Bates and Hockney travelled together, bleached their hair together, and despite being two of London's rising art stars, almost failed art school together. And in the middle of it all was the secretary of the Royal College's Painting School, an aspiring young novelist called Ann Quin.
