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Walking with Legends Mick Burns, 2007-10-01 Drummer record producer bandleader jazz researcher and cigar chomping raconteur Barry Martyn is a New Orleans original who happens to have been born in England Implausible though this may seem it makes perfect sense to members of the New Orleans traditional jazz community who view themselves as an extended family based on merit as much as nativity For more than forty years Martyn has been a fixture in the Crescent City's jazz scene laying down the beat for generations of celebrated musicians and avidly promoting the city's unique musical heritage around the world In *Walking with Legends* based on over forty hours of interviews with Martyn by fellow British jazz enthusiast and author Mick Burns Martyn reflects upon his life in jazz and offers a window into a musical world that few have understood let alone witnessed from the inside At the age of nineteen jazz fanatic Martyn found his way to the Crescent City and began working as a professional drummer in clubs and studios The first white man in the United States to join a black musician's union he eventually started his own record label and recorded hundreds of jam sessions that today are regarded as classics in Europe In 1972 he formed the Legends of Jazz an old style New Orleans jazz band that toured the world and took New Orleans jazz into the American showbiz mainstream Martyn's life story provides unique intimate glimpses of a vanished generation of New Orleans musicians including Louis Armstrong Kid Sheik Cola Harold Dejan Joe Watkins Albert Nicholas Kid Thomas Andrew Blakeney and many others Throughout his chronicle Martyn highlights the continual clash of cultures that arose from an avid British pupil learning lessons of life and music from elderly African American strangers who take him under their wing both out of curiosity and self interest Together they find a way to connect through music even if the road gets a little bumpy at times A standard bearer for New Orleans's jazz drumming tradition Martyn remains one of the city's busiest musicians and most avid promoters of New Orleans music In *Walking with Legends* he honors the legacies of the African American musicians who taught and inspired him and affirms the importance of the human relationships that make the music possible

A Trumpet around the Corner Samuel Charters, 2010-02-17 Samuel Charters has been studying and writing about New Orleans music for more than fifty years *A Trumpet around the Corner* The Story of New Orleans Jazz is the first

book to tell the entire story of a century of jazz in New Orleans Although there is still controversy over the racial origins and cultural sources of New Orleans jazz Charters provides a balanced assessment of the role played by all three of the city's musical lineages African American white and Creole in jazz's formative years Charters also maps the inroads blazed by the city's Italian immigrant musicians who left their own imprint on the emerging styles The study is based on the author's own interviews begun in the 1950s on the extensive material gathered by the Oral History Project in New Orleans on the recent scholarship of a new generation of writers and on an exhaustive examination of related newspaper files from the jazz era The book extends the study area of his earlier book *Jazz New Orleans 1885-1957* and breaks new ground with its in-depth discussion of the earliest New Orleans recordings *A Trumpet around the Corner* for the first time brings the story up to the present describing the worldwide interest in the New Orleans jazz revival of the 1950s and 1960s and the exciting resurgence of the brass bands of the last decades The book discusses the renewed concern over New Orleans's musical heritage which is at great risk after the catastrophe of Hurricane Katrina's floodwaters

Rose, Edmond Souchon, 1978 *Pioneers of Jazz* Lawrence Gushee, 2010-04-29 Thanks to the pioneering tours of the Creole Band jazz began to be heard nationwide on the vaudeville stages of America from 1914 to 1918 This seven piece band toured the country exporting for the first time the authentic jazz strains that had developed in New Orleans at the start of the 20th century The Creole Band has not heretofore been recognized for its unique importance But in his monumental careful research jazz scholar Lawrence Gushee firmly establishes the group's central role in jazz history

Charles Suhor, 2001-04-11 *Jazz in New Orleans* provides accurate information about and an insightful interpretation of jazz in New Orleans from the end of World War II through 1970 Suhor relying on his experiences as a listener a working jazz drummer and writer in New Orleans during this period has done a great service to lovers of New Orleans music by filling in some gaping holes in postwar jazz history and cutting through many of the myths and misconceptions that have taken hold over the years Skillfully combining his personal experiences and historical research the author writes with both authority and immediacy The text rich in previously unpublished anecdotes and New Orleans lore is divided into three sections each with an overview essay followed by pertinent articles Suhor wrote for national and local journals including *Down Beat* and *New Orleans Magazine* Section One *Jazz and the Establishment* focuses on cultural and institutional settings in which jazz was first battered then nurtured It deals with the reluctance of power brokers and the custodians of culture in New Orleans to accept jazz as art until the music proved itself elsewhere and was easily recognizable as a marketable commodity Section Two *Traditional and Dixieland Jazz* highlights the music and the musicians who were central to early jazz styles in New Orleans between 1947 and 1953 Section Three *An Invisible Generation* will help dispel the stubborn myth that almost no one was playing be bop or other modern jazz styles in New Orleans before the current generation of young artists appeared in the 1980s

Subversive Sounds Charles B. Hersch, 2008-09-15 *Subversive Sounds* probes New Orleans's history uncovering
