This book emphasizes that Black Power's reach and legacies can be understood only in the context of an ideologically diverse black community.

The Rhetorical Invention of Diversity M. Kelly Carr, 2018-05-01 Despite the tepid reception of *Regents of the University of California v. Bakke* in 1978, the Supreme Court has thrice affirmed its holding that universities can use race as an admissions factor to achieve the goal of a diverse student body. This book examines the process of rhetorical invention followed by Justice Lewis F. Powell Jr. and his colleagues and other interlocutors as they sifted through arguments surrounding affirmative action policies to settle on diversity as affirmative action's best constitutional justification. Here M. Kelly Carr explores the goals, constraints, and argumentative tools of the various parties as they utilized the linguistic resources available to them, including arguments about race, merit, and the role of the public university in civic life. Using public address texts, legal briefs, memoranda, and draft opinions, Carr looks at how public arguments informed the amicus briefs, chambers memos, and legal principles before concluding that Powell's pragmatic decision-making fused the principle of individualism with an appreciation of multiculturalism to accommodate his colleagues' differing opinions. She argues that *Bakke* is thus a legal and rhetorical milestone that helped to shift the justificatory grounds of race-conscious policy away from a recognition of historical discrimination and its call for reparative equality and toward an appreciation of racial diversity.

Britten,2020-05-07 The 1960s and 1970s were a time of radical change in U S history During these turbulent decades Native Americans played a prominent role in the civil rights movement fighting to achieve self determination and tribal sovereignty Yet they did not always agree on how to realize their goals In 1971 a group of tribal leaders formed the National Tribal Chairmen s Association NTCA to advocate on behalf of reservation based tribes and to counter the more radical approach of the Red Power movement Voice of the Tribes is the first comprehensive history of the NTCA from its inception in 1971 to its 1986 disbandment Scholars of Native American history have focused considerable attention on Red Power activists and organizations whose confrontational style of advocacy helped expose the need for Indian policy reform Lost in the narrative though are the achievements of elected leaders who represented the nation s federally recognized tribes In this book historian Thomas A Britten fills that void by demonstrating the important role that the NTCA as the self professed voice of the tribes played in the evolution of federal Indian policy During the height of its influence according to Britten the NTCA helped implement new federal policies that advanced tribal sovereignty protected Native lands and resources and enabled direct negotiations between the United States and tribal governments While doing so NTCA chairs deliberately distanced themselves from such well known groups as the American Indian Movement AIM branding them as illegitimate that is not real Indians and viewing their tactics as harmful to meaningful reform Based on archival sources and extensive interviews with both prominent Indian leaders and federal officials of the period Britten s account offers new insights into American Indian activism and intertribal politics during the height of the civil rights movement

Women Politicking Politely Kimberly Wilmot Voss,2017-04-05 This book includes the relatively unknown stories of six important women who laid the foundation for improving women s equality in the U S While they largely worked behind the scenes they made a significant impact In the group are two female political operatives who worked behind the scenes along with four female journalists who also occasionally worked within government to advance women s rights during the 1950s through the 1970s Much of it centers on Washington D C as well as the more unlikely cities of Madison Wisconsin and Miami Florida It includes the story of a women s page journalist who published an official government report in her newspaper section when the White House refused to release it This book documents the stories of women who organized to help gain employment for other women and also worked to raise the stature of homemakers Numerous other issues for women were also addressed The fight for equality became more visible in the 1960s although the foundation had been laid as early as the 1950s fueled by the post World War II era Change was initiated by a

mix of women in government and women in the news media at times going back and forth in those positions These particular women were chosen because of their interactions with each other as they rallied around a common cause and because their names were overshadowed by other women s liberation leaders It is not meant to be an exhaustive story of the fight for women s rights but rather an addition to the great memoirs and scholarship that already exist Recalibrating Reform Stuart Chinn,2014-04-21 Stuart Chinn highlights this phenomenon dubbed recalibration as a regular companion to reform and highlights the barriers to and possibilities for change in American politics Civil Rights Crossroads Steven F.
