The "Hacker Way" is Facebook's organizational culture, and it originates with CEO Mark Zuckerberg. The culture is equal parts egalitarian, risk-taking, collaborative, innovative, driven, and irreverent. 2008, Facebook started a process called Bootcamp to encapsulate its culture for new employees. Facebook grows so rapidly—more than 6000 employees have been hired since January 2009—that Bootcamp provides a hands-on glimpse into the company's values and culture.

Bootcamp is a six-week journey for every engineering hire, no matter how senior, and includes one-onone sessions with mentors and in-depth talks from senior engineers. New hires unlearn old habits as
they work on real software bugs right from day one. The program helps show them the ropes and
initiates them into Facebook's urgent, do-it-now culture. GJ Joel Seligstein, Facebook's Bootcamp
"Yoda," describes the program as learning "to think about how to attack challenges and how to meet
people. GH The result of Bootcamp is a culture that teaches employees how to act and react, how to
tackle problems independently, and how to take risks to keep Facebook growing rapidly and
successfully. Bootcamp is also adept at using feedforward controls as part of orientation and training. As
employees learn organizational culture, managers can also assess employee behaviours that might lead
to problems in the future.

One new recruit was working on a software bug and crashed part of Facebook, but the company culture is very tolerant of failure, as evidenced by its "Move Fast and Break Things" motto. Slogans like "We Hack Therefore We Are" are plastered everywhere around the office. Bootcamp helps keep Facebook nimble, and the culture of constant change helps provide its competitive advantage over rivals. It is not uncommon for employees to walk right up to Mark Zuckerberg to talk about an engineering fix or a company problem. This form of concurrent control is actually bottom-up instead of top-down and has
