Conservation is the careful use and protection of energy resources. It means not wasting energy.

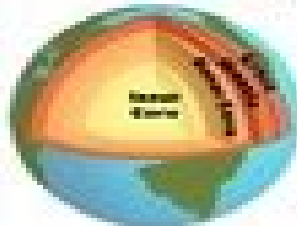
- Turn off lights and electronics when leaving a room.

Terms to Know

- Erosion:** The breaking down and changing of rocks and minerals due to natural processes.
- Strata:** The process of soil, rocks, and other sediments being carried away or moved by natural forces, such as wind, water, and ice.
- Deposition:** When lots of soil, rocks, and other sediments settle in a new place.

Layers of the Earth



The Earth has layers. Pressure and temperature increase the deeper you go below the Earth's surface.

- Crust:** The thin, outermost layer of the Earth. It is composed of solid rock.
- Mantle:** The largest layer that is between the crust and the outer core. It is made of hot, semi-solid rock.
- Outer Core:** The liquid layer surrounding the inner core.
- Inner Core:** A solid sphere at the center of the Earth. It is made of materials such as iron and nickel.

Earth's Movements

Divergent Boundaries

- Plates move apart from each other.
- Results in volcanoes and seafloor formation.



Convergent Boundaries

- Plates move toward each other.
- Results in earthquakes and mountain formation.



Transform Boundaries

- Plates slide past each other.
- Results in earthquakes.



Thermal Energy

Earth's thermal energy causes movement within the Earth. It creates currents in the mantle that move the Earth's tectonic plates. This plate movement can result in earthquakes, volcanoes, and mountain formation.
