## **New University London History Criticism:**

**Ridiculous Critics** Philip Smallwood, Min Wild, 2014-09-16 Ridiculous Critics is an anthology of eighteenth century writings on the figure of the literary critic and on the critic's mixed and complex role. The collection assembles critical texts and satirical images chronologically to suggest a vision of the history of eighteenth century literary criticism. Including comic, vicious, heartfelt and absurd passages from critics, poets, novelists and literary commentators, celebrated and obscure, the writings range through poetry, fiction, drama and periodical writing. The anthology also includes two original essays discussing and illustrating the irrepressible spirit of critical ridicule in the period and commending its value and effect. The first offers an evaluation of the merciless and sometimes shockingly venomous satirical attacks on critical habits and personalities of the eighteenth century. The editors argue that such attacks are reflexive in the sense that criticism becomes increasingly supple and able to observe and examine its own irresponsible ingenuities from within. The volume's concluding essay supplies an analysis of modern modes of criticism and critical history and suggests applications across time. We propose that humor's vital force was once an important part of living criticism. The eighteenth century mockery of critics casts light on a neglected common thread in the history of criticism and its recent manifestations; it prompts questions about the relative absence of comedy from the stories we presently tell about critics, dead or alive. The passages invite laughter both with the critics and at their expense and suggest the place that ridicule might have had since the eighteenth century in the making of judgments and in the pricking of critical pretension. For this reason they indicate the role that laughter may still have in criticism today and provide an encouraging precedent for its future.

Reconstructing Criticism Philip Smallwood, 2003 This study aims to bring the modern theory of literary criticism and Pope's Essay on Criticism of 1711 into a more productive and interesting association than critical historical structures have generally allowed. Smallwood marks out in current terms and in depth the specialized theoretical and aesthetic problem of defining criticism. He recognizes that criticism, no more than literature or art, cannot be finally codified or defined but insists on the need for clarity in the exposition of criticism's purposes and a fuller consciousness of a common community of practice.

**The Regulation and Reform of Music Criticism in Nineteenth-Century England** Paul Watt, 2017-11-22 Music criticism in England underwent profound change from the 1880s to the 1920s It gave rise to New criticism that aimed to be rational impartial and intellectually authoritative It was a break from the criticism of old the work of the opinionated journalist who wrote descriptive concert reviews with invective cliché bias and bombast Critics such as Ernest Newman 1868 1959 John F Runciman 1866 1916 and Michel D Calvocoressi 1877 1944 fostered this new school and wrote extensively of their aspirations for musical criticism in their own times and for the future This book charts the genesis of this new wave of musical criticism that sought to regulate and reform the profession of music critic Alongside the establishment of principles training manuals and schools for critics hundreds of journal articles and dozens of books were written that encouraged new criticism which also had a bearing on scholarly writing in biography aesthetics and history The Regulation and Reform of Music Criticism in Nineteenth Century England considers the influence and advocacy of individual critics and the role that institutions such as the Musical Association and the Musical Times played in this period of change The book also explores the impact that French and German writers had on their English counterparts demonstrating the internationalization of critical thought of the period

Critique of insufficient reason** Slavko Kacunko,2021-06-02 After Taste is an inquiry into a field of study dedicated to the reconsideration reconstruction and rehabilitation of the concept of Taste Taste is the category whose systematic historical and actual dimensions have traditionally been located in a variety of disciplines The actuality and potential of the study is based on a variety of collected facts from readings and experiences which materialize in the following features One concept figurative Taste two thinking traditions analytic and synthetic continental and three interrelated dimensions systematic historic and actual are presented in three volumes As such the study presents a salient comprehensive companion for wider readership of humanities approaching conceptions of Taste for the first time Moreover After Taste is intended for anyone who hopes to make a further contribution to the subject Since its appearance and apparently short triumph some 250 years ago the concept of non literary Taste remained the linchpin of aesthetic theory and practice but also a category outreaching aesthetics Taste as the personal unity of the production theory and criticism of art and literature which was still largely taken as a given in the eighteenth century has meanwhile given way to a highly differentiated art world in which aesthetic discourse is placed in such a way that it can seemingly no longer have a conceptual or linguistic effect on general opinion making The critical role of Taste judges ratings and rankings in the feuilleton politics and social media on the one hand and the responding search for new canons on the other have had a huge impact on the academic and popular discourse today However Taste s impact on society is in fact all encompassing and yet without getting even close to the magnetic North of the academic compass After Taste fills the gaps of systematic research by a comprehensive tracing of the emergence of the doctrines discourses and disciplinary dimensions of Taste up to the peak of its systematic and historical trajectory in the eighteenth century and onwards into the present day The guiding goal is a post disciplinary rehabilitation of the contested category as a preparation for its productive usage in emerging academic and popular contexts Three intertwined research hypotheses form the guiding goal of an overall study of the agencies of Taste its institutionalizations and expert cultures The 1 first part provides a missing systematic perspective on the concept of Taste as a key factor for understanding the human faculties value theories and practices of valuating The 2 second part traces the events at the peak of Taste s systematic and historical trajectories up until the late eighteenth century and verifies the historiographical hypothesis about the instrumentality of Taste for the production reception and distribution of culture The 3 third part reconstructs the major moments in which the contested concept of Taste experiences its post disciplinary rehabilitation in preparation for its future productive usage in the academic and popular discourses and practices It shows

how the category of Taste became the foundation legitimation and the catalyst for the emerging division of labour faculties and disciplines confirming the hypothesis of the immense impact and actuality of Taste in the contemporary world

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
