Ottoline Morrell Miranda Seymour, 2008 This biography reveals Ottoline Morrell London's leading literary hostess during the first three decades of the 20th century Augustus John T S Eliot D H Lawrence Lytton Strachey Virginia Woolf and W B Yeats enjoyed her hospitality and she was Bertrand Russell's mistress for many years To some she was a lover to others a confidante and adviser To many she was a mother substitute A half sister of the Duke of Portland and wife to a Liberal MP she ran a celebrated salon before the First World War swiftly emerging as a personality in her own right Her influence was enormous Huxley was one of many young writers who described her as having given him a complete mental re orientation Miranda Seymour is the only Bloomsbury biographer to be allowed access to family papers which include Morrell's lost correspondence with Lytton Strachey and the revealing private records she kept from 1902 the year of her marriage to her death in 1938 This is also the first life of Morrell to have full benefit of Bertrand Russell's 2 500 letters to her Fresh and often startling light is thrown not only on her passionate relationship with Russell and on her curious marriage to Philip Morrell which survived against all odds but also on the Bloomsberries their snobbery their malice and their deceit **The Life of D.**

Dance and the Modernist Imagination in Interwar Britain Rishona Zimring, 2016-12-05 Social dance was ubiquitous in interwar Britain. The social mingling and expression made possible through non theatrical participatory dancing in couples and groups inspired heated commentary both vociferous and subtle. By drawing attention to the ways social dance accrued meaning in interwar Britain, Rishona Zimring redefines and brings needed attention to a phenomenon that has been overshadowed by other developments in the history of dance. Social dance, Zimring argues, haunted the interwar imagination as illustrated in trends such as folk revivalism and the rise of therapeutic dance education. Social dance was pivotal in the construction of modern British society as well as the aesthetics of some of the period's most prominent intellectuals.

Aldous Huxley Annual Bernfried Nugel, Jerome Meckier, Volume 23-24 opens with a new selection of unpublished Huxley letters edited by James Sexton. Living at the Edge: a Biography of D.H. Lawrence and Frieda von Richthofen Michael Squires, Lynn K. Talbot, Lynn Kiefer Talbot, 2002 Dashing, told and meticulously researched, this double biography of D. H. Lawrence and his wife Frieda von Richthofen is the first to draw fully on Frieda's unpublished letters and on interviews with people who knew her well. It explores their collision with an industrial world they hated and chronicles the stormy relationship between husband and wife. The strong sexual vitality that inspired Lawrence's art brought both joy and anguish to his marriage. Here the Lawrences emerge as proud but not conceited in their unconventional lives, staunch in the face of fierce opposition from a conformist society. *Living at the Edge* follows the separate lives of Lawrence and Frieda up to their first meeting in 1912. Tracing their new life together, it depicts their grateful escape from the English Midlands, their discovery of exotic places where they made temporary homes: Italy, Cornwall, Australia, New Mexico, and Mexico.
