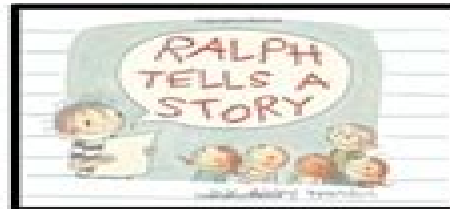

⑤ What Does Writing Look Like? Sound Like? Feel Like?



This lesson can be completed as one lesson or split into separate lessons. Have students think about what the classroom would look like, sound like and feel like if someone were to walk in during Writer's Workshop. Record their answers on the chart. Relate back to previous lesson on what good writers do!

⑥ Writing Tools



Writers need to use tools to help them write. Read aloud the book: The Day the Crayons Quit and lead discussion on what would happen if you didn't have access to specific writing tools. This is a good lesson to discuss your writing journals, notebooks, where your supplies are kept, etc.

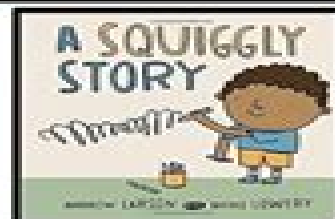
⑦ When You Think You're Done, You've Just Begun!



Read aloud the book: One Day, which is a bunch of very short stories. Discuss how writing is never finished because there is always more to do! Create an anchor chart with a list of options that students should complete when they think they are done (ex. Add details to your words, add details to your picture, check your work, start a new piece, etc.)

⑧ Writers STRETCH out Their Words!

⑨ How to Write a Story!



Use this lesson to model how writers should stretch out the sounds they hear in words to spell. Create anchor chart and model stretching out sounds and writing words. Introduce personal dictionary or word wall for words that students are not able to stretch out on their own.

Use this as an introductory lesson to the writing process. Discuss how writers need to think of an idea, plan out their story, and then begin writing. Model using your own story by thinking of an idea, planning out your thoughts, and then beginning to write.
