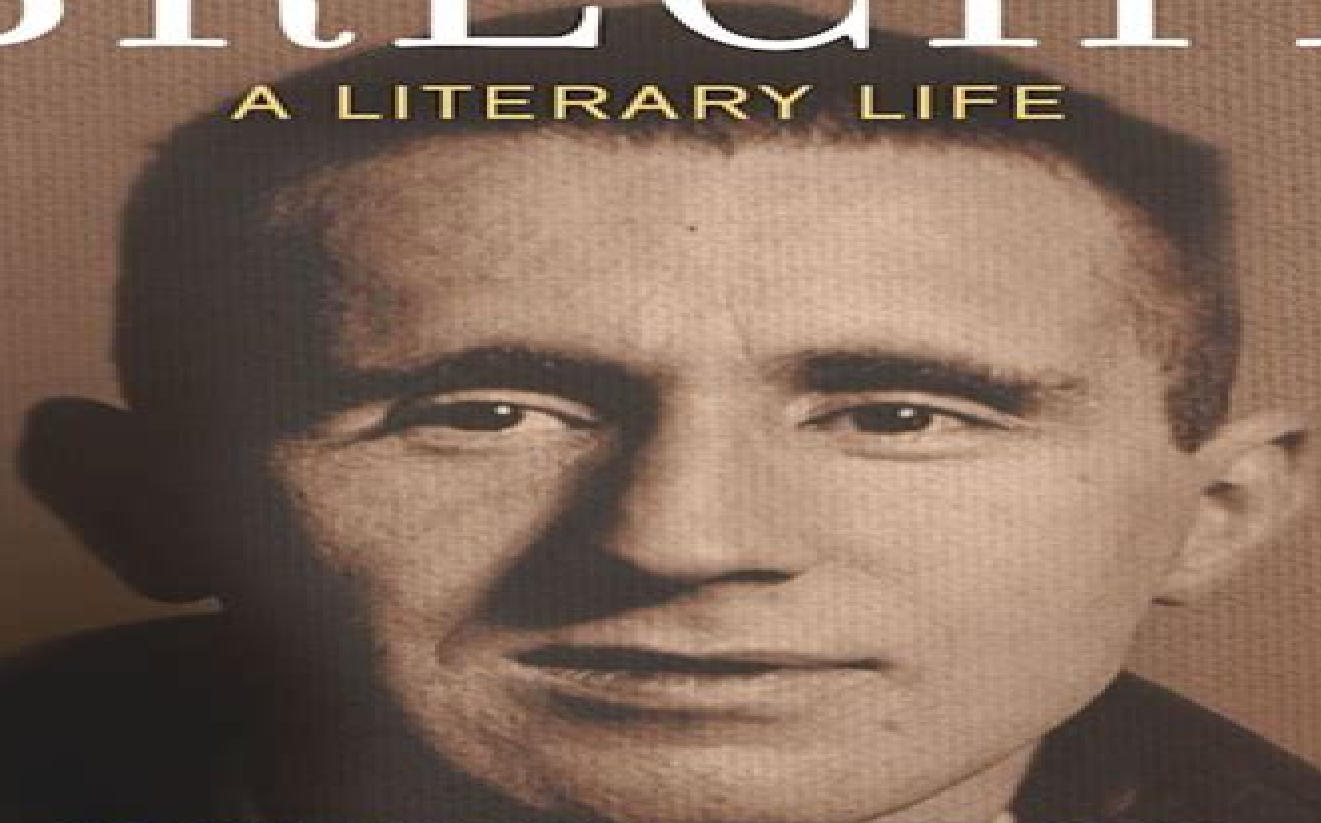

**Stalinism and the Dialectics of Saturn** Douglas Greene, 2023-03-20 This study examines the complicated legacy of Stalinism in the twentieth century The descent of the Russian Revolution into Stalinism has given rise to an oft accepted truism that revolutions are like Saturn and will devour their own children For anticommunists Stalinism is condemned as a bolt from blue whether an insidious contagion Big Brother or totalitarian reason that socialism cannot escape from On the other end Communists and their fellow travelers have seen Stalinism as a force of historical necessity and the only way for the working class to reach a communist society Both these twin camps accept a Dialectic of Saturn where Stalinism whether for evil or good is the preordained fate of all socialist revolutions However there is another position that views Stalinism as the product of material circumstance and class struggle This position was represented by Leon Trotsky in his seminal work The Revolution Betrayed In contrast to those who accept a mystical dialectic of Saturn Trotsky argued that Stalinism can be rationally explained and was not inevitable outcome of socialism

**Scenes from Bourgeois Life** Nicholas Ridout, 2020-06-22 *Scenes from Bourgeois Life* proposes that theatre spectatorship has made a significant contribution to the historical development of a distinctive bourgeois sensibility characterized by the cultivation of distance. In Nicholas Ridout's formulation, this distance is produced and maintained at two different scales. First is the distance of the colonial relation, not just in miles between Jamaica and London but also the social, economic, and psychological distances involved in that relation. The second is the distance of spectatorship, not only of the modern theatregoer as consumer but the larger and pervasive disposition to observe, comment, and sit in judgment, which becomes characteristic of the bourgeois relation to the rest of the world. This engagingly written study of history, class, and spectatorship offers compelling proof of why theater matters and demonstrates the importance of examining the question historically.

**Glorious Causes** Yale R. Magrass, Charles Derber, 2019-10-11 Drawing on historical cases of the American South before and after the Civil War, Europe especially Germany between the world wars, and the United States in Vietnam and its aftermath, this book takes a historical approach to explain the problems of capitalism and democratic leadership in western democracies today. Capitalist democracies proclaim equality, material prosperity, and comfort but produce extreme differences in wealth and power. They promise security and peace but deliver frequent wars. The promises broken, elites often turn to other visions, partially borrowed from feudalism, to win public support. Nations turn to honor, nobility, and war as a way of winning over workers and legitimating the capitalist system itself. Capitalism's contradictions often have produced a cultural divide. One side, cosmopolitans, urban, see themselves as citizens of the world, not one region or country; identify as secular, preach multi-culturalism, entertain state welfare systems, and are cautious about going to war. Their opponents, traditionalists, breed among people who feel left behind, anxiousness and insecurity, often embracing community, tradition, God, and family. The devastation of the world wars and the Third Reich led Europe to forgo visions of empire, militarism, and glory, and focus upon improving the quality of life for their own citizens. Although the United States does not need to experience comparable trauma, they should follow Europe's example, forget glory, and instead build a better life for the American people. The last chapter will consider how such a change could emerge in the US and who might help fight for it.

**The Sea View Has Me Again** Patrick Wright, 2020-12-08 The story of Uwe Johnson, one of Germany's greatest and most influential post-war writers, and how he came to live and work in Sheerness, Kent, in the 1970s. Towards the end of 1974, a stranger arrived in the small town of Sheerness on the Isle of Sheppey in Kent. He could often be found sitting at the bar in the Napier Tavern, drinking lager and smoking Gauloises while flicking through the pages of the Kent Evening Post. Charles was the name he offered to his new acquaintances. But this unexpected immigrant was actually Uwe Johnson, originally from the Baltic province of Mecklenburg in the GDR, and already famous as the leading author of a divided Germany. What caused him to abandon West Berlin and spend the last nine years of his life in Sheerness, where he eventually completed his great New York novel *Anniversaries* in a house overlooking the outer reaches of the Thames Estuary? And what did he mean by detecting a

moral utopia in a town that others including his concerned friends saw only as a busted slum on an island abandoned to deindustrialisation and a stranded Liberty ship full of unexploded bombs Patrick Wright who himself abandoned north Kent for Canada a few months before Johnson arrived returns to the island that is all the world to uncover the story of the East German author's English decade and to understand why his closely observed Kentish writings continue to speak with such clairvoyance in the age of Brexit Guided in his encounters and researches by clues left by Johnson in his own island stories the book is set in the 1970s when North Sea oil and joining the European Economic Community seemed the last hope for bankrupt Britain It opens out to provide an alternative version of modern British history a history for the present told through the rich and haunted landscapes of an often spurned downriver mudbank with a brilliant German answer to Robinson Crusoe as its primary witness

**Brecht in India** Dr. Prateek, 2020-11-12 Brecht in India analyses the dramaturgy and theatrical practices of the German playwright Bertolt Brecht in post independence India The book explores how post independence Indian drama is an instance of a cultural palimpsest a site celebrating a dialogue between Western and Indian theatrical traditions rather than a homogenous and isolated canon Analysing the dissemination of a selection of Brecht's plays in the Hindi belt between the 1960s and the 1990s this study demonstrates that Brecht's work provided aesthetic and ideological paradigms to modern Hindi playwrights helping them develop and stage a national identity The book also traces how the reception of Brecht was mediated in India how it helped post independence Indian playwrights formulate a political theatre and how the dissemination of Brechtian aesthetics in India addressed the anxiety related to the stasis in Brechtian theatre in Europe Tracking the dialogue between Brechtian aesthetics in India and Europe and a history of deliberate cultural resistance Brecht in India is an invaluable resource for academics and students of theatre studies and theatre historiography as well as scholars of post colonial history and literature

*Cold War Spy Stories from Eastern Europe* Valentina Glajar, Alison Lewis, Corina L. Petrescu, 2019-08-01 During the Cold War stories of espionage became popular on both sides of the Iron Curtain capturing the imagination of readers and filmgoers alike as secret police quietly engaged in surveillance under the shroud of impenetrable secrecy And curiously in the post Cold War period there are no signs of this enthusiasm diminishing The opening of secret police archives in many Eastern European countries has provided the opportunity to excavate and narrate for the first time forgotten spy stories Cold War Spy Stories from Eastern Europe brings together a wide range of accounts compiled from the East German Stasi the Romanian Securitate and the Ukrainian KGB files The stories are a complex amalgam of fact and fiction history and imagination past and present These stories of collusion and complicity betrayal and treason right and wrong and good and evil cast surprising new light on the question of Cold War certainties and divides

*Politics, Literature and Tertium Datur* Ivana Perica, 2025-08-21 Offers an alternate framing of the literary and political afterlives of revolution between 1928 1968 in Eastern and Western Europe Politics Literature and Tertium Datur combines the transfer of ideas between historical turning points with a comparative reading of political

*Politics and Literature at the Dawn of World War II* James A. W. Indem die Beiträge des Sammelbandes neben den Schnittmengen die Differenzen zwischen dem geschichtsabgewandten Ästhetizismus Benns und der geschichtszugewandten Gebrauchsliteratur Brechts herausarbeiten, werden zwei literarische Haltungen profiliert, die sich in Zustimmung und Ablehnung zu ideologischen Identifikationsmustern formierten.
