Mediating Germany Gerd Bayer, 2006 Containing a collection of essays this volume offers case studies of popular fiction theatre hip hop and rock music events like the love parade as well as describe developments in documentary filmmaking The chapters provide an analysis of both the issues in popular culture and the legacy of popular art forms throughout the twentieth century *German Pop Literature* Margaret McCarthy, 2015-04-24 Pop literature of the 1990s enjoyed bestselling success as well as an extensive and sometimes bluntly derogatory reception in the press Since then less censorious scholarship on pop has emerged to challenge its flash in the pan status by situating the genre within a longer history of aesthetic practices This volume draws on recent work and its attempts to define the genre locate historical antecedents and assess pop's ability to challenge the status quo Significantly it questions the official story of pop literature by looking beyond Ralf Dieter Brinkmann's works as origin to those of Jürgen Ploog Jörg Fauser and Hadayatullah Hirsch It also remedies the lack of attention to questions of gender in previous pop lit scholarship and demonstrates how the genre has evolved in the new millennium via expanded thematic concerns and new aesthetic approaches Essays in the volume examine the writing of well known established pop authors such as Christian Kracht Andreas Neumeister Joachim Lottman Benjamin Lebert Florian Illies Feridun Zaimoğlu and Sven Regener as well as more recent works by Jana Hensel Charlotte Roche Kerstin Grether Helene Hegemann and songwriter poet Peter Licht

Cultures of Violence in the New German Street Patricia Anne Simpson, 2011-11-21 In post Wall Germany violence both real and imagined is increasingly determining the formation of new cultural identities Patricia Anne Simpson's book focuses on the representation of violence in three youth subcultures often characterized by aggression as they enact a rivalry for supremacy on the new German street the author's operative metaphor to situate the cultural discourse about violence The selected literary texts films and music exemplify the urgent need for a sustained debate about violence as an aspect of both social reality and the national imaginary Simpson's study discloses the relationship between narratives of violence and issues of immigration ethnic difference and poverty Her lucid readings examine the ways in which violence is grounded in the asphalt of Germany's new street This interdisciplinary study identifies the motivations decisions and consequences of violent acts and the stories that convey them Simpson draws examples from popular genres and subcultures including punk hip hop and skinhead sounds styles and politics With theoretical sophistication and analytical clarity the author locates the contested territory of the street within larger European contexts of violence while paying careful attention to the particularities of German history She reveals new insights into the construction of citizenship masculinity and contemporary ethics In addition Simpson demonstrates the importance of concepts embedded in the representation of violence including revised definitions of heroism community and evolving ideas of fraternity family and home
