In her quest to piece together fragments of her family s past Hunting ends up crisscrossing the United States from California to Connecticut On her first trip across the Colorado Rockies to the fossil bed site near Russell Springs Kansas Hunting brings along her then twenty six year old daughter When the book opens mother and daughter are both at crossroads each seeking to understand the impact of personal decisions on the landscape of her life As Hunting ventures forward she encounters unexpected

resources such as ten year old triplets who converse with her about dinosaurs and a Connecticut museum where portraits of her ancestors hang on the walls Through lively descriptions of these visits Hunting advances a view of history as nonlinear and full of unlikely coincidences For Want of Wings is also the carefully researched story of the least known of Yale's four expeditions into the American West led by eminent paleontologist O C Marsh the friendship between Russell's father and abolitionist John Brown a portrait of a mother and daughter evolving in self understanding and an inquiry into matters of race in American history and the author's own family In the end all these pieces converge like fragments of a fossil to form an exquisitely patterned work of historical exploration **Cephalopods Present and Past: New Insights and Fresh** Perspectives Neil H.
